Benefits of Accreditation

- Establishes framework for continual review/update of polices
- Improves law enforcement and community relationships
- Creates agency accountability to the public and elected officials
- Develops improved methods for providing services to the community
- Enlarges the outlook and viewpoint of managers, officers, and employees

Where are we now?

- 61 Accredited Agencies

Municipal, County, and College/University

3 full-time employees to 300+ full-time employees

- 127 agencies in the process
- Represents over 43% of sworn municipal officers in Michigan
