This transfer is requested to increase the federal spending authority under the Great Lakes Restoration Program to align it with projected available grant revenue and eligible expenses. DARD is collaborating with DNR and DEQ to implement the Aquatic Invasive Species program, under which DARD conducts compliance monitoring inspections at firms dealing with aquatic organisms in trade in addition to providing education and outreach to facilitate industry participants to prevent the introduction and spreading of aquatic invasive species. The federal grant award period if from 07/2012 through 09/2014, yet various projects funded under this federal grant were not able to be completed until this fiscal year, which will increase the fiscal year 2013-14 expenditures above the appropriated amount. There is sufficient federal revenue to support this transfer. This transfer is needed by July 1, 2014.

This transfer is requested to increase the federal spending authority under various food safety research grants to align it with projected available grant revenue and eligible expenses. This increase will allow DARD to expend three, multi-year food safety related federal grants have recently been awarded for: 1) developing and implementing of an IT training system to support conformance with the Voluntary National Retail Food Regulatory Program Standers; 2) conducting a pilot program to improve coordination of multi-agency food emergency response actions in support of a national integrated food safety system; 3) staff training for evidence collection, aquaponics, drug residues in milk and animal tissue, and risk-based feed sanitation inspections. A similar adjustment has been requested in the FY 2014-15 Executive Recommendation. This transfer is needed by July 1, 2014.

This transfer is requested to increase the federal spending authority under various environmental stewardship programs to align it with projected available grant revenue and eligible expenses by conservation districts. DARD, through its partnership with local conservation districts, has been working with local farmers to facilitate eligibility to draw down these federal grants to improve farming practices and update infrastructure. Specifically, grant awards for 1) the Conservation Technical Assistance Initiative which provides conservation engineering assistance to landowners allowing them to receive federal cost share for implementation for engineered conservation practices and 2) financial assistance, including cost share, for farmers to use agriculture best practices to reduce sedimentation and nutrient loss from the Sebewing Watershed to the Saginaw Bay. Due to the type of pre-work that is required to be eligible for these funds, most of the expenditures from these grants will occur in FY 2013-14. Sufficient revenue is available to support this transfer which is needed by April 1, 2014.

This transfer increases the federal revenue authorization by \$1,297,100 for the Housing and Support Services line item, enabling the Department to recognize \$400,000 carried forward from the prior fiscal year for the federal Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) grant and increases in federal grant awards which include \$491,900 for Shelter Plus Care, \$28,800 for Shelter Plus Care – Substance Use Disorder, \$38,800 for Supportive Housing Program – Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness (PATH), \$324,800 for Supportive Housing Program (SHP- Statewide Leasing) and \$12,800 for HOPWA. This transfer is needed by July 1, 2014 to support anticipated contractual expenditures. This transfer increases the federal Medicaid revenue authorization by \$546,300 and local revenue authorization by \$60,700 for the Medicaid Mental Health Services line item, enabling the Department to support the projected number of 2,056 individuals per month that will receive services for their chronic conditions such as asthma, heart disease, mental condition, or substance use disorder through three behavioral health homes demonstration projects. The current budget includes \$900,000 Gross (\$90,000 GF/GP) for these projects which have been implemented to ensure better coordination of physical and behavioral health care for Medicaid beneficiaries. The local match funds are being provided by the Washtenaw county region which includes Washtenaw, Livingston, and Monroe counties. This transfer is needed by July 1, 2014.

This transfer increases the private funds authorization for the Michigan Essential Health Provider line item, enabling the Department to expend available private revenues \$605,000 in excess of the current authorization. Increased revenue of private matching funds is available from hospitals and other entities that employ participating health care providers of the Michigan Essential Health Provider State Loan Repayment Program. The funds support medical education loan repayments on behalf of health care providers serving for two or more years in designated medically underserved and health professional shortage areas. This is a federal/state program under which the federal grant requires matching funds from state, local or private sources. A similar transfer was made to the line item in FY 2012-13. The FY 2014-15 proposed budget includes a \$600,000 increase to this line item for additional private funds authorization. The Executive indicates that this transfer is needed by May 1, 2014.

This transfer increases the private funds authorization for the Epidemiology Administration line item, enabling the Department to expend available private revenues \$100,000 in excess of the current authorization. Private funding is available for the second year of a 3-year grant from the National Foundation for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, with funds from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation. The funds will be used for the Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring System (PRAMS) to assess the impact of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation-supported infant health programming. The Department contracts with Michigan State University for this data survey project. A similar transfer was made for this grant in FY 2012-13. The FY 2014-15 proposed budget includes an increase of \$100,000 to this line item for additional private funds authorization for the final year of this grant. The Executive indicates that this transfer is needed by April 30, 2014.
