RE: Legislative Transfer Package 2016-1

Attached are legislative transfers proposed by the State Budget Office in a letter dated January 13, 2016. Pursuant to section 393 of the Management and Budget Act, a legislative transfer must be approved by a majority of both the House and Senate Appropriations Committees, with identical funding sources and dollar amounts, in order to become effective. This transfer package may be considered by the House Appropriations Committee on Wednesday, January 20, 2016.

There are two basic types of legislative transfers, which have different effects on the overall level of appropriations in the state budget.

A **standard legislative transfer** shifts existing spending authorization between line items in a particular budget area, with no net change in total appropriations. Generally, such transfers are proposed when expenditures are higher than originally anticipated in one line item and lower than anticipated in another. These transfers can represent a shift of GF/GP funding between two line items, or merely a shift of spending authorization from same broad category of funding (federal, restricted, etc.) between the line items.

As shown in the attached table, standard transfers in this package total \$217.7 million, which will shift 0.40% of total appropriations within the existing FY 2015-16 year-to-date state budget.

A **contingency fund transfer** increases total line item appropriations in a budget area by moving contingency spending authorization from the boilerplate section of a budget act to a specific line item in order to recognize additional federal, private, local, or state restricted revenue that has become available since the original enactment of the budget. Absent the contingency fund transfer mechanism, this type of budget adjustment would be made through a supplemental appropriation bill.

This transfer is requested to enable the department to expand treatment protocols for Hepatitis C to align with the standard of care recently recommended by the Michigan Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee for Medicaid recipients. The department is legally required to provide the community standard of care to prisoners (*Estelle v. Gamble*).

In FY 2014, the department began using direct acting antiviral drugs to treat prisoners in F4 stage of Hepatitis C. This treatment protocol was modeled after protocol established by the Federal Bureau of Prisons and guidelines established by the American Association for the Study of Liver Diseases. Federal guidelines call for providing the new treatment protocol for both F3 stage (fibrosis) and F4 stage (cirrhosis) patients, as well as for patients who have been dually diagnosed with Hepatitis C and HIV. The department currently limits use of the new drugs to prisoners with F4 stage, while prisoners in earlier stages, as well as prisoners with dual diagnosis, remain eligible for other forms of treatment. To date, the department has provided direct acting antiviral drug treatment to 97 prisoners.

About 10% of the state's prisoner population has Hepatitis C. Most of the prisoner population that is positive for Hepatitis C does not show any symptoms and does not receive any kind of treatment. Prisoners are eligible for the new direct acting antiviral drug treatment protocol based on their health conditions, which are assessed by medical professionals. The most compromised prisoners, based on liver function, are given priority for treatment. There are roughly 170 prisoners with F4 stage of the disease and 170 prisoners with F3 stage who would meet recommendations for treatment, as suggested by the Pharmaceutical and Therapeutics Committee.

The department currently has 15 treatment slots for treating F4 stage prisoners. Treatment slots typically have a duration of 12 weeks, but may last 24 weeks for prisoners who need a second course of treatment. This means a total of up to 60 prisoners can be treated per year. With approval of this transfer, the department will be able to increase the number of treatment slots from 15 to 40, meaning they will be able to treat up to 160 prisoners annually. This will allow the department to address nearly half of the backlog of F4 cases in FY 2016. The average total cost of this drug treatment protocol is \$94,500 per prisoner and the drugs currently used are Vieikira Pak and Harvoni.

Funding will be made available from various correctional facility line items by delaying physical plant infrastructure projects and delaying purchases of equipment in order to support the transfer. Only projects and equipment purchases that can be delayed without impacting security at the facilities will be delayed. This transfer is requested by January 30, 2016.

This transfer request would provide \$35.5 million Gross (\$21.7 million GF/GP) in the Pharmaceutical Services, Healthy Michigan Plan, and Medical Care and Treatment line items to support new pharmaceutical costs associated with treating Medicaid and Children's Special Health Care Services beneficiaries with Cystic Fibrosis. In December 2015, the Michigan Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee recommended the use of specialty pharmacy treatments for Cystic Fibrosis. These funds would support half-year treatment costs for the approximately 320 beneficiaries who meet the treatment criteria recommended by the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee. The federal Omnibus

Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990 requires state Medicaid programs to cover all pharmaceutical products where the manufacturer has a Medicaid rebate agreement with the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. The drug recommended by the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee has a federal Medicaid rebate agreement.

The State Budget Office has indicated that funding is available through the Physician Services and Health Plan Services lines due to lower than anticipated Medicaid caseload expenditures and access to higher Federal SCHIP matching funds.

This transfer request would provide \$163.9 million Gross (\$43.8 million GF/GP) in the Pharmaceutical Services and Healthy Michigan Plan line items to support costs associated with coverage for new treatments for Hepatitis C. In December 2015, the Michigan Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee recommended the use of specialty pharmacy treatments for Hepatitis C. These funds would support treatment costs for 50% of the approximately 7,000 Medicaid beneficiaries known to have Hepatitis C, and who meet the treatment criteria recommended by the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee. Recommended treatment criteria include a diagnosed Metavir Score of F3 or F4, the use of a prior authorization process, an attestation that the beneficiary is not engaging in high risk behaviors, and that the beneficiary is committed to medication adherence.

The federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990 requires state Medicaid programs to cover all pharmaceutical products where the manufacturer has a Medicaid rebate agreement with the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. The drug recommended by the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee has a federal Medicaid rebate agreement.

The State Budget Office has indicated that funding is available through Medicaid caseload lines due to lower than anticipated Medicaid program caseload expenditures and greater access to higher Federal SCHIP matching funds.

This request transfers \$4.4 million GF/GP from the one-time Film Incentives appropriation to the one-time Special Grants appropriation to support a portion of Phase I of the Dort Highway Extension project. These funds were previously anticipated to lapse at year-end from the film incentives appropriation. The purpose of this project is to extend Dort Highway from I-75 to Baldwin Road in Genesee County in order to provide access to the western portion of the Genesys Health Park Campus. A Memorandum of Understanding between the Michigan Strategic Fund and the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) will be established granting MDOT oversight of the funds. Following approval of this transfer, a contract between MDOT and the Genesee County Road Commission will be initiated. MDOT awarded \$5.6 million in first-year funding for the project from the Priority Roads Investment Program appropriation in Public Act 356 of 2014.

The \$25.0 million GF/GP Film Incentives appropriation includes \$19,050,000 GF/GP to compensate the Michigan retirement systems for guarantees on debt associated with the Michigan Motion Picture Studios in Pontiac. An additional \$1.0 million GF/GP is dedicated to support Michigan Film Office administration. Approval of this transfer would leave \$550,000 GF/GP unencumbered which would be anticipated to lapse to the General Fund at the close of FY 2015-16 due to the elimination of the film incentive program.
