RE: Legislative Transfer Package 2016-3

Attached are legislative transfers proposed by the State Budget Office in a letter dated March 15, 2016 Pursuant to section 393 of the Management and Budget Act, a legislative transfer must be approved by a majority of both the House and Senate Appropriations Committees, with identical funding sources and dollar amounts, in order to become effective. This transfer package is scheduled to be considered by the House Appropriations Committee on Tuesday, April 19, 2016.

There are two basic types of legislative transfers, which have different effects on the overall level of appropriations in the state budget.

A **standard legislative transfer** shifts existing spending authorization between line items in a particular budget area, with no net change in total appropriations. Generally, such transfers are proposed when expenditures are higher than originally anticipated in one line item and lower than anticipated in another. These transfers can represent a shift of GF/GP funding between two line items, or merely a shift of spending authorization from same broad category of funding (federal, restricted, etc.) between the line items.

As shown in the attached table, standard transfers in this package total \$1.37 million, which will shift 0.0025% of total appropriations within the existing FY 2015-16 year-to-date state budget.

A **contingency fund transfer** increases total line item appropriations in a budget area by moving contingency spending authorization from the boilerplate section of a budget act to a specific line item in order to recognize additional federal, private, local, or state restricted revenue that has become available since the original enactment of the budget. Absent the contingency fund transfer mechanism, this type of budget adjustment would be made through a supplemental appropriation bill.

As shown in the attached table, contingency fund transfers in this package total \$34.43 million, which will increase the FY 2015-16 year-to-date state budget by 0.06%.

This transfer provides additional spending authority needed to recognize a United State Department of Agriculture (USDA) Biofuel Infrastructure Partnership (BIP) grant. Michigan was one of 21 states to receive grants through the BIP program. A USDA Fact Sheet indicates that the grants, which total \$100.0 million, are intended to expend the number of fueling station pumps capable of supplying higher blends of renewable fuel to consumers, such as E15 and E85. The added pumps would in turn provide additional markets for feedstock commodities.

Specifically, the \$3.0 million BIP grant awarded to the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development would provide 75% of the funding necessary for 89 additional flex-fuel pumps (the installation of 80 new pumps and the retrofit of 9 existing pumps) and 20 new storage tanks at 16 fueling stations. These additional pumps would increase the availability of higher blend pumps in Michigan by 13% - from 683 to 772. The 25% match requirement will be met with private funds; no state funds are needed to support this grant.

The department applied for the grant in cooperation with the Corn Marketing Program of Michigan (CMPM). The department will contract with the CMPM to administer the project; CMPM will work with fueling stations to coordinate the installation of devices and storage tanks. All installations supported by this grant are required to be operational by December 30, 2016. Funding is available from federal contingency funds provided in Article I, Section 206 of the FY 2015-16 appropriations act, (2015 PA 84).

This transfer increases the GF/GP funds authorization for the Rent and State Office Facilities line item. The funds will be used for assistance to Alger County with costs related to closure of a DHHS office effective October 1, 2015 and implemented as part of the FY 2015-16 DHHS budget. FY 2015-16 supplemental appropriations Act 143 of 2015 included a \$100 placeholder for funding regarding this concern. The Executive indicates that this transfer is needed by June 30, 2016.

Sufficient GF/GP funds are available from the Healthy Michigan Plan Administration line item for this transfer as the FY 2015-16 GF/GP appropriation for a public assistance call center exceeds planned expenditures. The Executive indicates that the call center is under development and implementation of a call center pilot project is planned for mid-year.

This transfer increases the federal funds authorization for the Michigan Medicaid Information System (MMIS) line item, enabling the Department to expend available federal revenues \$23,213,400 in excess of the current authorization. Increased funding is available from a federal grant for enhanced funding for the state's MMIS system, also known as CHAMPS, to support migration to a cloud-based information system. The current grant supports the procurement of additional hardware and software related to code migration to the cloud, and recognizes federal matching funds generated by the FY 2014-15 GF/GP provided for this project. The projected completion date of the project is January 2018. A similar transfer was made to the line item in FY 2014-15 in November 2015. The Executive indicates that this transfer is needed by April 30, 2016.

Federal contingency fund authorization is available for this transfer.

This transfer requests \$300,000 in federal contingency fund authorization to recognize additional federal revenues for the Bureau of Community Services and Outreach line item to support the Weatherization Assistance program. The funding will be used to hire 2 additional FTEs and 1 temporary employee. The Bureau of Community Services and Outreach has 16.0 FTE authorizations in the current fiscal year budget. According to the Department, additional staff is needed in order to fulfill the increased federal Training and Technical Assistance requirements contained within the federal Weatherization Grant. The additional funding would be used to hire contract employees for this purpose.

This transfer requests \$800,000 in private contingency fund authorization to recognize funding received from the Michigan Health Endowment Fund to expand funding of the Medical Services Health Home Project through Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHC's). Health Homes are an optional Medicaid benefit created under the Affordable Care Act to provide comprehensive care management, care coordination, health promotion, comprehensive transitional care, and referrals for persons with 2 or more chronic conditions (or have 1 serious and persistent mental health condition). The federal Medicaid match rate for Health Home services is 90% for the first 2 years. This project is a Mental Health and Wellness Initiative.

This transfer requests \$982,400 in federal contingency fund authorization to recognize funding received from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) for a Certified Community Behavioral Health Planning Grant. The project is a collaboration among the Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities Administration, the Michigan Association of Community Mental Health Boards, and the Medical Services Administration to develop the criteria for a certification process and prospective payment program that will more effectively serve individuals of all ages with behavioral health conditions in Michigan.

This transfer increases the state restricted funds authorization for the Emergency Medical Services Program line item, enabling the Department to expend available state restricted revenues \$103,700 in excess of the current authorization. Carryforward funding is available from increased revenue received from emergency medical services licensure fees. The funds will be used to support the existing licensure, continuing education and inspection program for emergency medical services personnel, operations and vehicles. The FY 2016-17 proposed budget includes a similar increase to this line item for increased fee revenue to the program. The Executive indicates that this transfer is needed by April 30, 2016.

State restricted contingency fund authorization is available for this transfer.

This transfer increases the federal funds authorization for the Local Health Services line item by \$1,250,000 and for the Chronic Disease Control and Health Promotion Administration line item by \$1,500,000, enabling the Department to expend available federal revenues \$2,750,000 in excess of the current authorization. Increased funding is available from the ongoing federal Health and Health Services Preventive Block Grant. The funding will be used to support chronic disease program projects such as health promotion and disease intervention, especially focusing on environmental strategies, health system interventions and community-clinical linkage strategies in a minimum of four high chronic disease burden communities to support obesity, heart disease, stroke, and diabetes prevention efforts. Two similar transfers were made to these line items in FY 2014-15. The enacted FY 2015-16 budget included an increase to this line item from other federal grants. The Executive indicates that this transfer is needed by April 30, 2016.

Federal contingency fund authorization is available for this transfer.

This transfer increases the private funds authorization for the Cancer Prevention and Control Program line item, enabling the Department to expend available private revenues \$42,000 in excess of the current authorization. Increased private funds are available from persons making a contribution for prostate cancer research through the State of Michigan income tax check off box for tax years 2008 and 2009 pursuant to Public Act 135 of 2007, and from other contributions. Donated funds are deposited to the Prostate Cancer Research Fund and are used for prostate cancer projects and grants to medical schools or hospitals pursuant to Public Act 135. Since 2007, \$223,100 has been expended from the contributions to the Fund. Current year expenditures of \$42,000 are planned supporting prostate cancer research activities through Wayne State University. The Executive indicates that this transfer is needed by April 30, 2016.

This transfer increases the state restricted authorization for the Respite Care Program line item, enabling the Department to expend available state restricted revenues \$550,000 in excess of the current authorization. Carryforward funding is available from the Senior Care Respite Fund. The funds will be used for the existing program through area agencies on aging of respite care services to assist family caregivers providing care to an elderly person in need of constant supervision. Respite may be provided in the home or in an adult day care setting. Revenue to the Senior Care Respite Fund is from escheats to the state from uncashed checks paid to subscribers or providers by the nonprofit mutual insurance corporation Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan. Statutory changes in 2010 (Act 197 PA 2010) shortened the unclaimed property period for uncashed checks creating a one-time acceleration of deposits to the Fund which are being expended by the program over a multi-year period. This transfer provides additional spending authority needed to allow for the expenditure of a Federal Transit Administration (FTA) grant awarded to the Capital Area Transportation Authority (CATA) for the development of a Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) project. The grant is awarded under the Small Starts category of the FTA Capital Investment Grant Program. In this instance, grant funding is passed through the Michigan Department of Transportation. Federal funds represent 80% of estimated project cost of the planning phase of the project. The transfer also provides for additional spending authority for the local share (10%) of the required 20% non-federal match. The State of Michigan would provide the remaining 10% non-federal match from state restricted funds already appropriated in the Service Initiatives line item.

The specific project involves a proposed 8.5 mile BRT line along the Michigan/Grand River Avenue corridor from the Meridian Mall in Meridian Township to the State Capitol in downtown Lansing. Funding is available from federal and local contingency funds established in Article XVII, Section 206, of the FY 2015-16 budget act, 2015 PA 84.
