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GLOSSARY Frequently-Used State Budget Terms

Adjusted Gross

Total net amount of all line item gross appropriations less (or minus) interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs)

Boilerplate

Specific language sections contained in an appropriations act which direct, limit or restrict line item expenditures, and/or require reports

Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF)

The countercyclical economic and budget stabilization fund—also known as the "rainy day" fund

Federal Revenues

Federal grant or matchable revenues dedicated to specific programs

General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP)

The state's primary operating fund; the portion of the state's General Fund that does not include restricted revenues

Gross Appropriations (Gross)

The total of all applicable line item spending authorizations

Interdepartmental Grant (IDG)

Revenue or funds received by one state department from another state department (usually for a service the receiving department provides)

Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT)

Transfers or funds being provided from one appropriation unit to another in the same department

Lapses

Unspent/unobligated funds remaining in line item accounts at the end of the fiscal year

Line Items

Specific funding amount in an appropriations bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function (may be for a single purpose or for multiple purposes)

Local Revenue

Revenues from local units of government

State Restricted (Restricted Funds)

State revenue dedicated to a specific fund; revenue which results from state mandates or initiatives; used for used for specific programs pursuant to the Constitution or statute

Private Funds

Revenues from non-government entities such as rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals, payments from individuals, and gifts and bequests

School Aid Fund (SAF)

The primary funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts (ISDs)

Work Project

An account established to allow for certain specific unspent funds to be carried over from one fiscal year to a succeeding fiscal year or years

DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AND VETERANS AFFAIRS

The Department of Military and Veterans Affairs has two primary missions. The first is to execute the duties laid down by state statute and the Governor. This mission includes oversight of the state's veterans programs: (1) the state veterans homes in Grand Rapids and Marquette, (2) grants to veterans service organizations, and (3) the Michigan Veterans Trust Fund.

The Department's second mission is to ensure preparedness of the Michigan National Guard to (1) protect the lives and property of Michigan citizens during times of natural disaster and preserve the peace, order, and public safety at the direction of the Governor and (2) assist the federal government in defending the sovereign interests of the United States when they are threatened or violated.

SECTION 103: MILITARY TRAINING SITES AND SUPPORT FACILITIES

This appropriations unit provides for administration of the five National Guard training sites in the state: Camp Grayling, Fort Custer, Battle Creek Air National Guard Base, Selfridge Air National Guard Base, and the Alpena Combat Readiness Training Center. This unit also funds the operations of various logistical support facilities in the state.

SECTION 106: GRAND RAPIDS VETERANS' HOME

The Grand Rapids Veterans' Home was established by Public Act 152 of 1885 to provide care for aged and disabled veterans. Later amendments to statute extended admission eligibility to widows, widowers, spouses, former spouses, and parents of state veterans. The home provides three levels of care: (1) domiciliary, (2) nursing, and (3) special needs. The facility is governed by a Board of Managers (with oversight of both state veterans homes) consisting of seven members appointed by the Governor.

The home provides three levels of care: (1) domiciliary, (2) nursing, and (3) special needs. The facility is governed by a Board of Managers (with oversight of both state veterans homes) consisting of seven members who are appointed by the Governor.

SECTION 108: MICHIGAN VETERANS' TRUST FUND

Public Act 9 of 1946 established the \$50.0 million Michigan Veterans' Trust Fund. The majority of the earnings from the trust fund are used to fund the Emergency Grant Program, which provides grants to veterans in temporary financial difficulty. Earnings are also used to fund the Tuition Grant Program, which provides college tuition for the children of veterans killed or disabled in the line of duty pursuant to Public Act 245 of 1935. The fund is overseen by a board of seven members appointed by the Governor. The State Constitution was amended in 1996 to require the approval of the trust fund board for any expenditures or transfers from the fund.

In 1997, the Department was reorganized to place greater emphasis upon the various veterans programs it oversees. As part of this reorganization, the Veterans' Affairs Directorate was established to oversee these responsibilities in a coordinated manner.

SECTION 109: INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Executive Order 2001-3 created the Department of Information Technology (DIT), responsible for managing the state's information technology resources. Sec. 201. Payments to Locals

Itemizes payments to locals from funds appropriated.

Sec. 202. Management and Budget Act

Subjects appropriations to Management and Budget Act.

Sec. 203. Terms and Acronyms

Defines various terms and acronyms used in act.

Sec. 204. Department of Civil Service 1% Charge

Provides for payment of constitutionally authorized 1% charge to Department of Civil Service.

Sec. 205. State Classified Service Hiring Freeze

Imposes hiring freeze on state classified civil service; exempts internal transfers and provides for other exceptions.

Sec. 206. Contingency Funds

Appropriates contingency funds for transfer to other line items pursuant to Management and Budget Act— Federal: \$5.0 million, State Restricted: \$2.0 million, Local: \$100,000, Private: \$100,000.

Sec. 207. Privatization Plans

Requires submission of project plan to Legislature 60 days before beginning any effort to privatize.

Sec. 208. Reporting Via Internet

Requires Department to use Internet for reporting requirements.

Sec. 209. American Goods and Services

Prohibits purchase of foreign goods and services if comparably priced American goods and services are available.

Sec. 210. Deprived and Depressed Communities

Requires that reasonable steps be taken to ensure businesses in deprived and depressed communities compete for and perform state contracts.

Sec. 211. Creation and Retention of Reports.

Requires Department to create and retain reports for funds appropriated.

Sec. 212. National Guard Education Assistance Program

Provides for Michigan National Guard Education Assistance Program; sets expenditure limit of \$2.0 million; allows 50% tuition reimbursement for National Guard members up to \$2,000 per year; provides for administration of program by Department and authorizes expenditures for promotion of program and recruitment efforts.

Sec. 213. Armory Closure or Consolidation

Requires Department to consult with appropriations subcommittees regarding projected closing or consolidation of any National Guard armories.

Sec. 259. Information Technology - User Fees

Provides for Department to pay user fees to Department of Information Technology, subject to an interagency agreement.

Sec. 260. Information Technology - Work Projects

States that amounts appropriated for information technology may be designated as work projects pursuant to Management and Budget Act.

Sec. 261. Early Retirement and Budgetary Savings

Provides for transfer of negative appropriations for early retirement and budgetary savings to other line items pursuant to Management and Budget Act.

Sec. 301. Armory Rental Fee

Allows Department to charge a reasonable fee for rental of an armory.

Sec. 302. Challenge Program - Donations and Participant Fee

Provides that private donations to Challenge Program not lapse to General Fund at close of fiscal year; allows Department to charge fee for program participants from families with incomes that exceed 200% of federal poverty guidelines.

Sec. 303. Oak Park Armory Property

Provides for reappraisal of Oak Park Armory property; grants City of Oak Park right to purchase property at appraisal value; states that section does not amend Michigan Military Act.

Sec. 304. Challenge Program - Partnership with FIA

Directs Department to partner with Family Independence Agency (FIA) to identify youth for Challenge Program; grants such youth priority for enrollment in program.

Sec. 501. Grant to Veterans Service Organizations (VSOs)

Restricts use of grant funds to costs related to accredited veterans service advocacy officers and support/managerial staff; specifies requirements for receipt of grant funds by VSOs; sets requirements for grant to a newly-founded VSO; requires an accounting of expenditures, budget request, and various other information to be submitted by each VSO to Department and Legislature.

Sec. 601. Veterans and Veterans' Families

Prohibits use of veterans homes appropriations for any purpose other than veterans and veterans' families.

Sec. 602. Veterans Homes Annual Report

Requires annual report containing specified information regarding the two veterans homes.

Sec. 603. Board of Managers Appropriations

Provides that funds appropriated for Board of Managers of veterans homes may be expended for facility improvements at the homes and other purposes benefiting veterans.

Sec. 703. Veterans Trust Fund Annual Report

Requires annual report on emergency and tuition grants provided from Veterans Trust Fund and other fundrelated information.

Sec. 704. County Veterans Counselor Training

Directs Veterans Affairs Directorate to assist county veterans counselors in obtaining training.
