GLOSSARY

STATE BUDGET TERMS

Gross Appropriations (Gross): The total of all applicable appropriations (statutory spending authorizations) in a budget bill.

Adjusted Gross Appropriations (Adjusted Gross): The net amount of all gross appropriations after subtracting interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs).

Lapses: Appropriation amounts that are unspent/unobligated at the end of a fiscal year. Appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless otherwise provided by law.

Work Project: A statutorily-authorized account which allows a spending authorization to be carried over from one fiscal year to a succeeding fiscal year or years—i.e., allows funds to be spent over a period of years.

APPROPRIATION BILL TERMS

Line Item: Specific funding amount in an appropriation bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function (may be for a single purpose or for multiple purposes).

Boilerplate: Specific language sections in an appropriation bill which direct, limit or restrict line item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

REVENUE SOURCES

General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP): Unrestricted General Fund revenue available to fund any activity accounted for in the General Fund; unused GF/GP revenue lapses to the General Fund at the end of a fiscal year.

State Restricted (Restricted): State revenue restricted by state law or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; at year-end, unused restricted revenue remains in the restricted fund.

Federal Revenue: Federal grant or matchable revenue dedicated to specific programs.

Local Revenue: Revenue from local units of government.

Private Revenue: Revenue from non-government entities: rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals or individuals, and gifts and bequests.

Interdepartmental Grant (IDG): Revenue or funds received by one state department from another state department (usually for a service provided by the receiving department).

Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT): Transfers or funds being provided from one appropriation unit to another in the same department.

MAJOR STATE FUNDS

Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF): The countercyclical economic and budget stabilization fund; also known as the "rainy day" fund.

School Aid Fund (SAF): A restricted fund; the primary funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts (ISDs).

General Fund: The General Fund (funded from taxes and other general revenue) is used to account for the ordinary operations of a governmental unit that are not accounted for in another fund.

NATURAL RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENT

The Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) and the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) are required to be merged into one department, the new Department of Natural Resources and Environment (DNRE), by Executive Order 2009 - 45. Because the Executive Order was not disapproved by both houses of the Legislature by December 7, 2009, it became effective on January 17, 2010. The funding for both departments is included in Public Act 118 of 2009 in anticipation of the subsequent creation of the new department in January. In the bill, each department has its own individual appropriations section in Part 1 of the bill, followed by a joint boilerplate section in Part 2.

SECTION 102(8): WASTE AND HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

The Waste and Hazardous Materials Division is responsible for the regulation and disposal of hazardous and non-hazardous solid and liquid wastes, scrap tires, radioactive materials, and for the land application of processed solid waste. The Division administers the solid waste management program, radiological protection program, and medical waste regulation program; registers disposal facilities and waste transporters; and regulates the design, construction, and operation of above-ground and underground storage tanks. Grant funds are provided for cleanup and disposal of abandoned scrap tires, development of markets for scrap tires, and indoor radon education and testing.

Specifies total state spending and expected grants to locals from state revenue sources.

Sec. 202. Appropriations Subject to Management and Budget Act

Expends appropriations under the limitations and requirements of Management and Budget Act.

Sec. 203. Acronyms Definitions

Defines acronym definitions contained in this appropriation act.

Sec. 204. Civil Service Charges

Requires Department of Civil Service to charge state departments 1% of salary payments, pursuant to Section 5, Article XI of the State Constitution.

Sec. 206. Internet Availability of Required Reports

Requires departments to use Internet for reporting requirements; authorizes transmission of reports via e-mail.

Sec. 207. Restricted Fund Revenue, Expenditures, Fund Balances, and FTE Information

Requires report of revenue, spending, and estimated year-end balance for each restricted fund appropriated; requires report on number and funding of FTE positions that are supported by each line item.

Sec. 208. Department Grant and Loan Programs

Requires report including description of available grant/loan programs, criteria for awards, and a list of recipients.

Sec. 209. Game and Fish Protection Fund Appropriations

Lists appropriations to other state departments from the Game and Fish Protection Fund.

Sec. 210. Waterways Fund Projects

Requires DNR to report on activities of Waterways Commission during the previous fiscal year; list of completed waterways fund projects to be provided to Legislature and State Budget Director by January 31, 2010.

Sec. 211. Game and Fish Trust Fund Transfer

Transfers \$6.0 million from Game and Fish Protection Trust Fund to Game and Fish Protection Fund.

Sec. 212. Information Services User Fees

Directs DEQ and DNR to pay user fees to DIT for technology-related services and projects.

Sec. 213. Out-of-State Travel Restrictions

Limits purpose/amount of out-of-state travel in FY 2009-10; requires annual report on January 1 for prior fiscal year.

Sec. 214. Purchase of Foreign Goods and Services

Prohibits DEQ and DNR to purchase foreign goods and services if competitively prices and of comparable quality American goods or services are available; requires preference to goods and services manufactured by Michigan businesses and manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses owned and operated by veterans.

Sec. 215. Businesses in Economically Deprived or Depressed Communities

Encourages DEQ and DNR to enter into contracts with vendors located in economically depressed communities.

Sec. 216. Disciplinary Action Against State Employees

Prohibits DEQ and DNR from disciplining state employees for communicating with members of the Legislature and their staffs.

Sec. 217. Rule Promulgation

Requires a report on any policy changes made to implement a public act; DEQ and DNR are not allowed to adopt a rule that will apply to a small business if it has a disproportionate economic impact.

Sec. 218. Legal Services

DEQ and DNR are denied permission to hire attorney to provide legal services provided by the Attorney General.

Sec. 219. Restricted Fund Allocation Plan

Requires DEQ and DNR to develop a plan for allocating restricted funds among administrative support and regulatory activities; plan to be submitted to legislative subcommittees by January 30, 2010.

Sec. 220. Contingency Fund Transfer Authority

Provides authority for contingency fund transfers: up to \$33.0 million federal, \$10.0 million restricted, \$200,000 local, and \$1.5 million private.

Sec. 221. Out-of-State State Employee Training

Prohibits out-of-state travel to attend a conference or seminar for more than one employee unless the travel is funded by a federal or private source, or conference includes multiple issues in which one employee does not have expertise.

Sec. 222. FTE Report

Requires DEQ and DNR to report on the number of FTEs in pay status on the first day of the month; report required every other month.

Sec. 223. Detailed Appropriated and Supportable FTE Information

Requires DEQ and DNR to report on supportable FTEs including salary, wage and fringe benefit costs for FTEs for each line item.

Sec. 224. Consolidated Report on Environmental Cleanup Projects

Requires DEQ to provide status report with detailed information on approved cleanup projects funded through environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup, emergency actions, superfund cleanup, revitalization revolving loan program, Brownfield grants and loans, leaking underground storage tank cleanup program, contaminated lake and river cleanup program, and environmental protection bond projects.

Sec. 225. Appropriations for Environmental Cleanup Projects

Re-appropriates unspent cleanup and redevelopment fund, leaking underground storage tank, bottle deposits fund, and Clean Michigan Initiative bond response activities funding for expenditure for any site listed in an appropriation act.

Sec. 226. Michigan Youth Conservation Council - VETOED

Includes environmental education appropriation of \$5,000 for MSU Extension Service 4-H programs for the Michigan Youth Conservation Council.

Sec. 227. Restricted Fund Allocation Plan for Administrative Units

Requires DEQ to develop cost allocation plan concerning restricted funds for administrative units; requires report.

Sec. 228. Intent to Consolidate DNR/DEQ

States legislative intent to re-combine DEQ and DNR, making DNR the successor agency.

Sec. 229. DNR/DEQ Department Consolidation Savings

Provides that appropriations in part 1 assume acceptance of an executive order to re-combine DEQ and DNR.

Sec. 230. DEQ Spending Limitation

Provides that after November 1, 2009, DEQ may not make expenditures from part 1 unless a notice of intent to spend is provided to the Speaker of the House of Representatives 30 days in advance.

Sec. 231. DEQ Pending Permits

Any permit application pending after a 2 year period shall be considered administratively complete on January 1, 2010

Sec. 232. Expenditure Reports: FY 2008-09

Requires DEQ and DNR to report expenditures on a publicly accessible internet site, including the purpose for which the expenditures were made.

Sec. 233. Report Retention

Requires DEQ and DNR to retain copies of all reports funded through this act; reports are to be received and provided for public use, following state and federal guidelines.

Sec. 234. Settlement Fund Revenue Carryforward

Allows carryforward of up to \$2.5 million of settlement fund revenue into FY 2010-11.

Sec. 235. Criminal and Civil Fine Revenue

Requires DEQ and DNR to annually report by December 31 the amount of criminal and civil fine revenue collected during FY 2008-09.

Sec. 236. General Fund Lapse - NEW

Requires DEQ and DNR to report by September 30, 2010 the estimated amount of general fund lapse by program.

Sec. 237 (1). Best Available Retrofit Technologies (BART)

Requires DEQ to use BART standards in actions taken on air pollution permits.

Sec. 237 (2). Best Available Retrofit Technologies (BART) Feasibility Study - VETOED

Requires DEQ to pay if a feasibility study of BART is required.

Sec. 238. Great Lakes Quality Bond Fund Report

Requires DEQ to report on amount/disposition of Great Lakes water quality bond funds and descriptions of activities supported from bond revenue.

Sec. 239. Program Comparisons With Other States

Requires DEQ to compare its regulatory programs with similar activities in other Great Lakes States; requires report.

Sec. 240. Permit Program Efficiencies

Requires DEQ to study its air permitting program to determine efficiencies; requires report.

Sec. 241. Beverage Container Fraud

Requires DEQ to implement 2008 PA 389 concerning reverse vending machines and beverage container standards.

Sec. 242. Freedom of Information Requests

Requires DEQ and DNR to report semi-annually on freedom of information requests.

ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY

Sec. 301. Wetlands Protection Program Supplemental

States legislative intent to address funding needs for the wetlands regulatory program through supplemental appropriation of restricted use funds if necessary to maintain previous year funding level.

Sec. 302. Laboratory Services Revenue Carryforward

Allows carryforward of unspent interdepartmental laboratory revenue.

Sec. 303. Work Projects – Environmental Response Programs

Considers appropriations for emergency cleanup action to be a work project.

Sec. 304. Restricted Fund Transfer: Cleanup and Redevelopment Trust Fund

Transfers \$1.0 million from the Cleanup and Redevelopment Trust Fund to the Environmental Protection Fund.

Sec. 305. Restricted Fund Transfer: Community Pollution Prevention Fund

Transfers \$1.0 million from the Community Pollution Prevention Fund to the Environmental Protection Fund.

Sec. 306. Refined Petroleum Fund

States legislative intent to restore \$70.0 million Refined Petroleum Fund transferred to General Fund in FY 2006-07.

Sec. 308. Operational Memoranda

Prohibits DEQ from expending funds if using operational memoranda or similar documents to impose regulations on individuals or businesses conducting environmental cleanup projects without written consent.

Sec. 401. Solid Waste Management Fund

Appropriates \$1.5 million from solid waste management fund perpetual care account to the solid waste management fund staff account.

Sec. 402. Septage Waste Compliance Program Grants

Allows DEQ to provide septage waste compliance services if a certified health department does not exist in a city, county, or district, or if the county health department fails to fulfill mandated responsibilities.

Sec. 501. Water Quality Enforcement Report

Requires report on enforcement and program activities funded from National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Fund.

Sec. 601. Scrap Tire Fire Suppression Costs

Provides \$100,000 for grants to communities for scrap tire suppression costs, provided that owner liability bonds and other available funding sources have been exhausted.

NATURAL RESOURCES

Sec. 701. Engineering Service Charges

Allows fee charge against capital outlay or special maintenance appropriation to recover engineering service cost.

Sec. 702. Land Acquisition Fee Charges

Allows fee charge against land acquisition projects to recover actual service costs.

Sec. 703. Land Sale Revenue

Allows collecting application and transaction fees for exchange or sale of state-owned land or rights in land.

Sec. 704. Fishing Advisories

Directs DNR to include website address in the fishing guide for fishing advisory information from Department of Community Health.

Sec. 705. Land Transactions

Requires detailed report to Legislature on land purchases, sales and exchanges.

Sec. 801. Livestock Loss Indemnification

Requires DNR to reimburse Department of Agriculture for livestock losses caused by wolves, coyotes, or cougars.

Sec. 802. Bovine TB Eradication Efforts

Requires semiannual reports on enforcement actions taken to eradicate bovine TB, relevant scientific studies and the number of deer found to be infected.

Sec. 901. Water Control Structure Certification

Directs Fisheries Division to not interfere with the certification process for dams and other water control structures.

Sec. 902. Stream Habitat Improvement Grants

Appropriates \$758,000 to watershed councils, resource development councils, soil conservation districts, local governmental units, and other nonprofit organizations for stream habitat improvement projects.

Sec. 1001. Natural Resource Trust Fund Transfer

Authorizes \$10.0 million transfer (mineral royalty revenue) from Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund to Michigan State Park Endowment Fund as required by law.

Sec. 1002. State Park Campground Closures

Requires DNR to notify Legislature if Department intends to reduce operations or reduce recreation opportunities at any state park or recreation area.

Sec. 1003. Porcupine Mountain Ski Hill

Prohibits DNR from altering or stopping operations of the ski hill or demolishing any buildings related to the ski hill in Porcupine Mountains Wilderness State Park.

Sec. 1004. Defibrillators in State Parks

Directs DNR to maintain defibrillators placed in state parks.

Sec. 1101. Mackinac Island State Park

Requires that revenue from admission fees and store sales at Mackinac Island State Park be deposited into the Mackinac Island State Park operation fund; remaining funds at end of year shall not lapse to the general fund.

Sec. 1201. Abandoned Mine Shaft Closures

Appropriates \$350,000 for Abandoned Mine Shaft Closures.

Sec. 1202. Contract Foresters

Allows DNR to hire contract foresters to mark timber.

Sec. 1203. Timber Marking

Directs DNR, subject to forest certification process, to mark and prescribe treatment on 63,000 acres, prepare for harvest 58,000 acres at an average rate of 12.5 to 15.0 cords per acre; impact of timber harvest on wildlife habitat and recreation uses to be considered; requires quarterly report.

Sec. 1204. Jordon River Trail Connection to Village of Bellaire - VETOED

Requires DNR to allow access across state-owned land to allow connection of the Jordon River snowmobile Trail to the Village of Bellaire.

Sec. 1205. Federal Forest Fire Compact Expenditure Authorization

Allows expenditure of funds for forest fire suppression efforts on federal lands, provided DNR is reimbursed.

Sec. 1206. Horseback Riding Opportunities

Directs DNR to explore opportunities to increase horseback riding opportunities.

Sec. 1207. State Timber Bidding Process

Directs DNR to work with the commission and stakeholders to review current timber bidding process; requires report.

Sec. 1301. Snowmobile Law Enforcement Grants

Provides snowmobile law enforcement grant funds to county law enforcement agencies in counties with state snowmobile trails.

Sec. 1302. Island Lake Shooting Range Concession Contract

Requires public notice of the expiration date or adoption of amendments to the concession contract to operate the Island Lake Shooting Range.

Sec. 1401. Federal Mineral Royalty Payments to Local Governmental Units

Appropriates federal mineral royalty revenue to support pass-through grants to local governments affected by mineral or forestry development on federal lands; requires annual report.

Sec. 1402. Off Road Vehicle (ORV) Trail Improvement Grants

Requires the expenditure of not less than \$980,000 for the development of new ORV trails.

Sec. 1501. Capital Outlay Appropriations for the Harbors and Docks Grants in Aid

Provides for disbursement of Waterways Fund appropriation to the federal government and local governmental units.

Sec. 1502. Lump Sum Appropriations

Provides for state budget director approval of disbursements of lump sum appropriations for DNR program or facility needs. Funds are available for three years after appropriation.

Sec. 1503. Capital Outlay

Provides for capital outlay appropriations to be carried forward at the end of the fiscal year.

Sec. 1601. Federal Historic Preservation Grants: Work Project Designation

Provides work project status to federal grants for local historic preservation projects.

Sec. 1602. Michigan Heritage Fund

Revenues collected through the Michigan Heritage Fund are appropriated, and available for expenditure upon receipt

Sec. 1603. Museum Store Revolving Fund

Contract expenditures for the Museum Store are exempt from the Management and Budget Act.

Sec. 1604. Freedom Trail Funding

Requires \$25,000 funding for historical administration and services be appropriated for the Freedom Trail Commission.

Sec. 1605. Proceeds from Artifact Auctions, Sales, or Transfers

Funds received through the excess of unneeded artifacts by the Historical Museum are appropriated to the DNR for the purpose of obtaining other items desired for the historical collection of the State Historical Museum.

Sec. 1701. Consolidation Savings - VETOED

Provides that the negative appropriation for savings realized from creating a single department from DEQ and DNR shall be satisfied through elimination of duplicative administration, space consolidation and other efficiencies; requires consolidation plan.
