STATE BUDGET TERMS

Gross Appropriations (Gross): The total of all applicable appropriations (statutory spending authorizations) in a budget bill.

Adjusted Gross Appropriations (Adjusted Gross): The net amount of all gross appropriations after subtracting interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs).

Lapses: Appropriation amounts that are unspent/unobligated at the end of a fiscal year. Appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless otherwise provided by law.

Work Project: A statutorily-authorized account which allows a spending authorization to be carried over from one fiscal year to a succeeding fiscal year or years—i.e., allows funds to be spent over a period of years.

APPROPRIATION BILL TERMS

Line Item: Specific funding amount in an appropriation bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function (may be for a single purpose or for multiple purposes).

Boilerplate: Specific language sections in an appropriation bill which direct, limit or restrict line item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

REVENUE SOURCES

General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP): Unrestricted General Fund revenue available to fund any activity accounted for in the General Fund; unused GF/GP revenue lapses to the General Fund at the end of a fiscal year.

State Restricted (Restricted): State revenue restricted by state law or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; at year-end, unused restricted revenue remains in the restricted fund.

Federal Revenue: Federal grant or matchable revenue dedicated to specific programs.

Local Revenue: Revenue from local units of government.

Private Revenue: Revenue from non-government entities: rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals or individuals, and gifts and bequests.

Interdepartmental Grant (IDG): Revenue or funds received by one state department from another state department (usually for a service provided by the receiving department).

Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT): Transfers or funds being provided from one appropriation unit to another in the same department.

MAJOR STATE FUNDS

Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF): The countercyclical economic and budget stabilization fund; also known as the "rainy day" fund.

School Aid Fund (SAF): A restricted fund; the primary funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts (ISDs).

General Fund: The General Fund (funded from taxes and other general revenue) is used to account for the ordinary operations of a governmental unit that are not accounted for in another fund.

DEPARTMENT OF STATE POLICE

The Department of State Police (DSP) has several missions, including the deterring of criminal activity, seeking, detecting, and arresting offenders of the law, enhancing traffic safety, deterring motor vehicle crashes, enforcing the Michigan Vehicle Code, and providing services that support and coordinate the efforts of law enforcement agencies and the entire criminal justice community.

Restricts At-Post Troopers appropriation to specified trooper-related expenses; states legislative intent to maintain atpost trooper strength of 1,075 troopers; requires report of plan to add troopers, including any additional funds needed.

Sec. 219. Post Closure or Consolidation

Requires the Department to notify subcommittees not less than 180 days before recommendation to close/consolidate a State Police post.

Sec. 220. Assistance to Unserved or Underserved Communities

Directs the Department to provide general law enforcement assistance to unserved or underserved communities until such services can be provided by other means.

Sec. 221. Marshall Post

Allows the Department to enter into an agreement with Calhoun County to build a new post in Marshall to replace the current post in Battle Creek.

Sec. 223. Out-of-State Travel Limitations

Prohibits out-of-state travel except when certain conditions apply.

Sec. 224. Disciplinary Actions for Employees

Directs the Department to not take disciplinary action against employees for communicating with the Legislature.

Sec. 226. State, Local, and Regional Interoperable Communications Plans

Encourages developing state, local, and regional interoperable communications plans among local, regional, state, and federal agencies; requires report by April 1, 2011, concerning interoperability efforts.

Sec. 232. MCOLES Certified Police Officers for Trooper School

Emphasizes recruiting MCOLES certified police officers for the trooper recruit school.

Sec. 234. Attorney General Legal Services

Prohibits appropriated funds being spent on legal services that are the responsibility of the Attorney General.

Sec. 235. Special Operations and Events Spending Plan

Specifies that any shortfall of funds for special operations and events purposes not be covered from the Post Uniform Services or Forensic Sciences units and any excess funds remaining for special operations and events purposes be transferred to the Post Uniform Services and Forensic Sciences units.

Sec. 238. Building Operations and Leasing Costs

Requires the Department to work with the DMB to reduce building operations and leasing costs for all DSP facilities and to identify efficiencies and savings.

Sec. 239. Michigan International Speedway Traffic Control

Provides legislative intent to utilize available funds to be used for traffic control purposes at the Michigan International Speedway by the Department.

Sec. 240. Contingency Funds

Provides \$10.0 million for federal contingency funds, \$3.5 million for state restricted contingency funds, \$1.0 million for local contingency funds, and \$200,000 for private contingency funds. Contingency funds are appropriated in boilerplate and must be transferred to a line item to be authorized for expenditure.

Sec. 241. Byrne Justice Assistance Grant To Judiciary

Directs the Department to provide a \$1.8 million Byrne Justice Assistance Grant to the Judiciary through an interdepartmental grant.

Sec. 242. GF/GP Lapse Report

Directs the Department to prepare and transmit a report with GF/GP lapse estimates by September 30, 2011.

Sec. 245. DHS Bridges Case Management System/LEIN Cooperation

Directs the Department to work cooperatively with DHS to coordinate LEIN and the DHS Bridges case management system for determining assistance services due to a person's law enforcement status.

Sec. 253. Posting Expenditures on a Publicly Accessible Internet Site

Directs the Department to work with DTMB to develop and maintain a publicly accessible Internet site to post the Department's expenditures. The cost of this site would not exceed \$10,000.

Sec. 254. FTE Report

Directs the Department to report on a bimonthly basis the number of FTEs in pay status by Civil Service classification.

Sec. 301. Law Enforcement Information Network (LEIN) User Fees

Specifies that for FY 2010-11, LEIN subscribers shall not be billed a user fee to support LEIN except for subscribers with an outstanding balance from previous fiscal years.

Sec. 302. Department of Information Technology (DIT) User Fees

Directs the Department to pay user fees to DTMB, subject to an interagency agreement.

Sec. 303. Information Technology (IT) Work Projects

States that amounts appropriated for IT may be designated as work projects.

Sec. 304. Law Enforcement Information Network (LEIN) Departmental Policies

Requires report on the Department's policies regarding access to and use of information from LEIN.

Sec. 305. LEIN Suspected Abuses

Requires suspected incidents of improper access to or use of information from LEIN be investigated; requires report if such an incident is determined to be an illegal act.

Sec. 306. LEIN Probation Information

Requires probation information be placed on LEIN; requires submission of any statutory amendments necessary to accomplish goal.

Sec. 307. Communication Towers

Directs the Department to act as liaison between local government units and DTMB to encourage local use of Michigan Public Safety Communications System (MPSCS) towers.

Sec. 308. LEIN Fee Increase Announcement

Requires report concerning any LEIN fee increase 60 days prior to the implementation of the increase.

Sec. 309. Electronic Insurance Data System Request For Proposal

Allows the Department to issue a request for proposal to develop, implement, and maintain and electronic insurance data system for real-time enforcement of vehicle insurance.

Sec. 310. Michigan Public Safety Communications System Expansion and Upgrades

Provides legislative intent for expansion and upgrades of the Michigan Public Safety Communication System (MPSCS) to allow more local users to utilize the system. Requires the MPSCS to use restricted funds, federal funds, and other non-GF/GP funds for this purpose.

Sec. 401. Secondary Road Patrol and Training Fund

Requires a biannual report on fund collections and grant allotments, including comparisons of revenue collections to grant distributions, current-year appropriation levels, and prior-year expenditure levels.

Sec. 501. DNA Protocol

Directs the Department to post on its website when changes are made to the protocol for retaining and purging DNA samples and records.

Sec. 502. Evidence Collection by Health Care Providers

Directs the Department to work with specified health organizations to ensure that recommendations regarding evidence collection in sexual assault cases are followed.

Sec. 601. State Reimbursement for Training

Provides that 100% of the determined state reimbursement rate for Training to Locals program be distributed upon certification by the Commission on Law Enforcement Standards.

Sec. 603. Mental Health Awareness Training

Provides grant funds for training law enforcement officers, mental health practitioners, and other criminal justice personnel with assisting people with mental illness.

Sec. 604. MCOLES Certification For Motor Carrier Officers and Capitol Security Officers

Allows MCOLES funds to be used for training and certifying motor carrier officers and Capitol security officers.

Sec. 801. Emergency Management Funds

Authorizes state director of emergency management to expend appropriations to mobilize resources or provide for health or safety of any area of the state in which the Governor declares a state of emergency or state of disaster; requires report on actions taken under this authorization; directs budget director to review expenditures and submit recommendation to Legislature on need for a supplemental appropriation; authorizes the Department to receive and expend funds from local, private, federal, or state sources for emergency management-related activities; requires report to Legislature if additional expenditure authorization is approved.

Sec. 803. Homeland Security Grants to First Responders

Encourages the Department to allocate homeland security funds to first responder entities in the highest percent possible; prohibits the City of Detroit from supplanting general funds with homeland security grants to Detroit.

Sec. 901. Highway Safety Fund

Stipulates that State Police enlisted personnel employed to enforce traffic laws with funds from Highway Safety Fund not be prohibited from responding to crimes and emergencies.

Sec. 902. Capitol Security Guards

Requires funding for the Capitol Security Guards line to be used only for security services at the Capitol Building and allows response to emergencies at other buildings and parking areas near the Capitol Building.

Sec. 1002. Canine Unit Donations

Requires private donations to canine unit be used for purchases to enhance operation of the unit; states legislative intent that private donations not supplant general fund appropriations.

Sec. 1101. Areas Near State Prisons

States that sufficient money is appropriated to ensure that citizens in vicinity of a state police prison not experience a downgrading of State Police criminal investigation services.

Sec. 1102. Methamphetamine Reporting

Requires the Department to report methamphetamine criminal related activities to the appropriations committees.

Sec. 1201. School Bus Inspections

Requires report on annual inspections of school buses and other vehicles pursuant to state statute; directs the Department to provide certificate to a school system whose buses all receive a 100% successful inspection upon first inspection of the year.
