GENERAL SECTIONS

19 Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state
20 constitution of 1963, total state spending from state sources under
21 part 1 for fiscal year 2022-2023 is \$880,260,300.00 and state
22 spending from state sources to be paid to local units of government
23 for fiscal year 2022-2023 is \$97,579,700.00. The itemized statement
24 below identifies appropriations from which spending to local units
25 of government will occur:

13 Sec. 202. The appropriations authorized under this part and
14 part 1 are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
15 MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

16 Sec. 203. As used in this part and part 1:

17 (a) "CJIS" means Criminal Justice Information Systems.

18 (b) "Department" means the department of state police.

19 (c) "Director" means the director of the department.

20 (d) "DNA" means deoxyribonucleic acid.

21 (e) "DTMB" means the department of technology, management, and
22 budget.

23 (f) "Eligible public safety entity" means a local public
24 safety department, sheriff's department, court, or detention
25 facility that employs public safety officers, first responders,
26 local corrections officers, public safety telecommunicators, or
27 juvenile detention employees.

28 (g) "FTE" means full-time equated.

29 (h) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.



1 (i) "Juvenile detention employee" means an individual employed
2 by a court- or county-operated juvenile detention facility.

3 (j) "Local corrections employee" means an individual employed
4 as a corrections officer by a sheriff or local police department in
5 a jail or lockup.

6 (k) "Local public safety department" means all public safety
7 departments, organizations, and entities that employ law
8 enforcement officers certified by the Michigan commission on law
9 enforcement standards.

10 (l) "MCOLES" means the Michigan commission on law enforcement
11 standards created in section 3 of the Michigan commission on law
12 enforcement standards act, 1965 PA 203, MCL 28.603.

13 (m) "Public safety telecommunicator" means an individual
14 employed by a public safety answering point.

15 (n) "SIGMA" means the statewide integrated governmental
16 management application.

17 (o) "Subcommittees" means the subcommittees of the senate and
18 house standing committees on appropriations with jurisdiction over
19 the budget for the department.

20 Sec. 204. The department and agencies receiving appropriations
21 in this part and part 1 shall use the internet to fulfill the
22 reporting requirements of this part. This requirement must include
23 transmission of reports via email to the recipients identified for
24 each reporting requirement and it must include placement of reports
25 on an internet site.

26 Sec. 205. To the extent permissible under section 261 of the
27 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1261, all of the
28 following apply to the funds appropriated in part 1:

29 (a) Funds must not be used for the purchase of foreign goods



1 or services, or both, if competitively priced and of comparable
2 quality American goods or services, or both, are available.

3 (b) Preference must be given to goods or services, or both,
4 manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses, if they are
5 competitively priced and of comparable quality.

6 (c) Preference must be given to goods or services, or both,
7 that are manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses owned and
8 operated by veterans, if they are competitively priced and of
9 comparable quality.

10 Sec. 206. The department shall not take disciplinary action
11 against an employee of the department or a departmental agency in
12 the state classified civil service because the employee
13 communicates with a member of the legislature or a member's staff,
14 unless the communication is prohibited by law and the department or
15 departmental agency taking disciplinary action is exercising its
16 authority as provided by law.

17 Sec. 207. The department shall prepare a report on out-of-
18 state travel expenses not later than January 1 of each year. The
19 travel report shall be a listing of all travel by classified and
20 unclassified employees outside this state in the immediately
21 preceding fiscal year that was funded in whole or in part with
22 funds appropriated in the department's budget. The report shall be
23 submitted to the senate and house appropriations committees, the
24 senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state budget office. The
25 report shall include the following information:

26 (a) The dates of each travel occurrence.

27 (b) The total transportation and related costs of each travel
28 occurrence, including the proportion funded with state general
29 fund/general purpose revenues, the proportion funded with state



1 restricted revenues, the proportion funded with federal revenues,
2 and the proportion funded with other revenues.

3 Sec. 208. Funds appropriated in this part and part 1 shall not
4 be used by a principal executive department, state agency, or
5 authority to hire a person to provide legal services that are the
6 responsibility of the attorney general. This prohibition does not
7 apply to legal services for bonding activities and for those
8 outside services that the attorney general authorizes.

9 Sec. 209. Not later than November 30, the state budget office
10 shall prepare and transmit a report that provides for estimates of
11 the total general fund/general purpose appropriation lapses at the
12 close of the prior fiscal year. This report shall summarize the
13 projected year-end general fund/general purpose appropriation
14 lapses by major departmental program or program areas. The report
15 shall be transmitted to the chairpersons of the senate and house
16 appropriations committees, the subcommittees, and the senate and
17 house fiscal agencies.

18 Sec. 210. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
19 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$2,000,000.00 for
20 federal contingency authorization. These funds are not available
21 for expenditure until they have been transferred to another line
22 item in part 1 under section 393(2) of the management and budget
23 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

24 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
25 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000.00 for state
26 restricted contingency authorization. These funds are not available
27 for expenditure until they have been transferred to another line
28 item in part 1 under section 393(2) of the management and budget
29 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.



1 Sec. 211. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
2 department shall provide to the DTMB information sufficient to
3 maintain a searchable website accessible by the public at no cost
4 that includes, but is not limited to, all of the following for the
5 department:

6 (a) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by category.

7 (b) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by appropriation unit.

8 (c) Fiscal year-to-date payments to a selected vendor,
9 including the vendor name, payment date, payment amount, and
10 payment description.

11 (d) The number of active department employees by job
12 classification.

13 (e) Job specifications and wage rates.

14 Sec. 212. Within 14 days after the release of the executive
15 budget recommendation, the department shall provide to the state
16 budget office information sufficient to provide the senate and
17 house appropriations chairs, the subcommittees chairs, and the
18 senate and house fiscal agencies with an annual report on estimated
19 state restricted fund balances, state restricted fund projected
20 revenues, and state restricted fund expenditures for the prior 2
21 fiscal years.

22 Sec. 213. The department shall maintain, on a publicly
23 accessible website, a department scorecard that identifies, tracks,
24 and regularly updates key metrics that are used to monitor and
25 improve the department's performance.

26 Sec. 214. Total authorized appropriations from all sources
27 under part 1 for legacy costs for the fiscal year ending September
28 30, 2023 are estimated at \$145,238,000.00. From this amount, total
29 department appropriations for pension-related legacy costs are



1 estimated at \$94,652,600.00. Total department appropriations for
2 retiree health care legacy costs are estimated at \$50,585,400.00.

3 Sec. 215. To the extent permissible under the management and
4 budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594, the director shall
5 take all reasonable steps to ensure that businesses in deprived and
6 depressed communities compete for and perform contracts to provide
7 services or supplies, or both. The director shall strongly
8 encourage firms with which the department contracts to subcontract
9 with certified businesses in depressed and deprived communities for
10 services or supplies, or both.

11 Sec. 216. (1) On a quarterly basis, the department shall
12 report to the senate and house appropriations committees, the
13 subcommittees, and the senate and house fiscal agencies the
14 following information:

15 (a) The number of FTEs in pay status by type of staff and
16 civil service classification.

17 (b) A comparison by line item of the number of FTEs authorized
18 from funds appropriated in part 1 to the actual number of FTEs
19 employed by the department at the end of the reporting period.

20 (2) By March 1 of the current fiscal year, the department
21 shall report to the senate and house appropriations committees, the
22 subcommittees, and the senate and house fiscal agencies the
23 following information:

24 (a) Number of employees that were engaged in remote work in
25 2022.

26 (b) Number of employees authorized to work remotely and the
27 actual number of those working remotely in the current reporting
28 period.

29 (c) Estimated net cost savings achieved by remote work.



1 (d) Reduced use of office space associated with remote work.

2 Sec. 217. Appropriations in part 1 shall, to the extent
3 possible by the department, not be expended until all existing work
4 project authorization available for the same purposes is exhausted.

5 Sec. 218. If the state administrative board, acting under
6 section 3 of 1921 PA 2, MCL 17.3, transfers funds from an amount
7 appropriated under this act, the legislature may, by a concurrent
8 resolution adopted by a majority of the members elected to and
9 serving in each chamber, intertransfer funds within this act for
10 the particular department, board, commission, officer, or
11 institution.

12 Sec. 219. The department and agencies receiving appropriations
13 in part 1 shall receive and retain copies of all reports funded
14 from appropriations in part 1. Federal and state guidelines for
15 short-term and long-term retention of records shall be followed.
16 The department may electronically retain copies of reports unless
17 otherwise required by federal or state guidelines.

18 Sec. 220. The department shall report not later than April 1
19 on each specific policy change made to implement a public act
20 affecting the department that was enacted and took effect during
21 the prior calendar year to the senate and house appropriations
22 committees, the subcommittees, the joint committee on
23 administrative rules, and the senate and house fiscal agencies.

24 Sec. 221. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
25 department shall do all of the following:

26 (a) Report to the senate and house appropriations committees,
27 the senate and house fiscal agencies, the senate and house policy
28 offices, and the state budget office any amounts of severance pay
29 for a department director, deputy director, or other high-ranking



1 department official not later than 14 days after a severance
 2 agreement with the director or official is signed. The name of the
 3 director or official and the amount of severance pay must be
 4 included in the report required by this subdivision.

5 (b) Maintain an internet site that posts any severance pay in
 6 excess of 6 weeks of wages, regardless of the position held by the
 7 former department employee receiving severance pay.

8 (c) By February 1, report to the subcommittees, the senate and
 9 house fiscal agencies, the senate and house policy offices, and the
 10 state budget office on the total amount of severance pay remitted
 11 to former department employees during the fiscal year ending
 12 September 30, 2022 and the total number of former department
 13 employees that were remitted severance pay during the fiscal year
 14 ending September 30, 2022.

15 (2) As used in this section, "severance pay" means
 16 compensation that is both payable or paid upon the termination of
 17 employment and in addition to either wages or benefits earned
 18 during the course of employment or generally applicable retirement
 19 benefits.

20 Sec. 222. (1) Any department, agency, board, commission, or
 21 public officer that receives funding under part 1 shall not do the
 22 following:

23 (a) Require as a condition of accessing any facility or
 24 receiving services that an individual provide proof that he or she
 25 has received a COVID-19 vaccine except as provided by federal law
 26 or as a condition of receiving federal Medicare or Medicaid
 27 funding.

28 (b) Produce, develop, issue, or require a COVID-19 vaccine
 29 passport.



1 (c) Develop a database or make any existing database publicly
2 available to access an individual's COVID-19 vaccine status by any
3 person, company, or governmental entity.

4 (d) Require as a condition of employment that an employee or
5 official provide proof that he or she has received a COVID-19
6 vaccine. This subdivision does not apply to any hospital,
7 congregate care facility, or other medical facility or any
8 hospital, congregate care facility, or other medical facility
9 operated by a local subdivision that receives federal Medicare or
10 Medicaid funding.

11 (2) A department, agency, board, commission, or public officer
12 may not subject any individual to any negative employment
13 consequence, retaliation, or retribution because of that
14 individual's COVID-19 vaccine status.

15 (3) Subsection (1) does not prohibit any person, department,
16 agency, board, commission, or public officer from transmitting
17 proof of an individual's COVID-19 vaccine status to any person,
18 company, or governmental entity, so long as the individual provides
19 affirmative consent.

20 (4) If a department, agency, board, commission, subdivision,
21 or official or public officer is required to establish a vaccine
22 policy due to a federal mandate it must provide exemptions to any
23 COVID-19 vaccine policy to the following individuals:

24 (a) An individual for whom a physician certifies that a COVID-
25 19 vaccine is or may be detrimental to the individual's health or
26 is not appropriate.

27 (b) An individual who provides a written statement to the
28 effect that the requirements of the COVID-19 vaccine policy cannot
29 be met because of religious convictions or other consistently held



1 objection to immunization.

2 (5) As used in this section, "public officer" means a person
3 appointed by the governor or another executive department official
4 or an elected or appointed official of this state or a political
5 subdivision of this state.

6 Sec. 223. Based on the availability of federal funding and
7 demonstrated need, as indicated by applications submitted to the
8 state court administrative office, the department shall provide
9 \$1,500,000.00 in Byrne justice assistance grant program funding to
10 the judiciary by interdepartmental grant.

11 Sec. 224. The department shall provide biannual reports to the
12 subcommittees, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state
13 budget office that provide the following data:

14 (a) A list of major work projects, including the status of
15 each project.

16 (b) The department's financial status, featuring a report of
17 budgeted versus actual expenditures by part 1 line item including a
18 year-end projection of budget requirements. If projected department
19 budget requirements exceed the allocated budget, the report shall
20 include a plan to reduce overall expenses while still satisfying
21 specified service level requirements.

22 (c) A report on the performance metrics cited or information
23 required to be reported in this part, reasons for nonachievement of
24 metric targets, and proposed corrective actions.

25 Sec. 225. The department shall notify the subcommittees, the
26 chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations committees, and
27 the senate and house fiscal agencies not less than 90 days before
28 recommending to close or consolidate any state police post. The
29 notification shall include a local and state impact study of the



1 proposed post closure or consolidation.

2 Sec. 226. At least 90 days before beginning any effort to
3 privatize, the department shall submit a complete project plan to
4 the subcommittees and the senate and house fiscal agencies. The
5 plan shall include the criteria under which the privatization
6 initiative will be evaluated. The evaluation shall be completed and
7 submitted to the subcommittees and the senate and house fiscal
8 agencies within 30 months.

9 Sec. 227. (1) When the department provides contractual
10 services to a local unit of government, the department shall be
11 reimbursed for all costs incurred in providing the services.

12 (2) The department shall define service cost models for those
13 services requiring reimbursement.

14 (3) Contractual services provided to an entity other than a
15 local unit of government may be provided by department personnel,
16 but only on an overtime basis outside the normal work schedule of
17 the personnel. All costs incurred in providing the services are
18 eligible for reimbursement.

19 (4) This section does not apply to services provided to state
20 agencies.

21 (5) Revenues received for contractual or reimbursed services
22 in excess of the appropriations in part 1 are appropriated and may
23 be received and expended by the department for the purposes for
24 which the funds are received.

25 (6) If additional authorization is approved in SIGMA by the
26 state budget office under this section, the department shall notify
27 the subcommittees and the senate and house fiscal agencies within
28 10 days after the approval. The notification shall include the
29 amount and funding source of the additional authorization, the date



1 of its approval, and the projected use of funds to be expended.

2 Sec. 228. The department shall serve as an active liaison
3 between the DTMB and state, local, regional, and federal public
4 safety agencies on matters pertaining to the Michigan public safety
5 communications system and shall report user issues to the DTMB.

6 Sec. 229. The department may establish and collect fees for
7 publications, videos, conferences, workshops, and related
8 materials. Collected fees shall be used to offset expenditures for
9 costs of the publications, videos, workshops, conferences, and
10 related materials. The department shall not collect fees under this
11 section that exceed the cost of the expenditures.

12 Sec. 230. (1) The department may accept monetary and
13 nonmonetary gifts, bequests, donations, contributions, or grants
14 from any private or public source to support, in whole or in part,
15 a departmental function or program. The department shall expend or
16 use such gifts, bequests, donations, contributions, or grants for
17 the purposes designated by the private or public source, if the
18 purpose is specified.

19 (2) Revenue collected by the department under this section
20 that is unexpended and unencumbered shall not lapse to the general
21 fund but shall be carried forward to the subsequent fiscal year.

22 (3) Private revenues received under this section that exceed
23 the appropriations in part 1 are appropriated and may be received
24 and expended by the department for the purposes for which the funds
25 are received.

26 (4) If additional authorization is approved in SIGMA by the
27 state budget office under this section, the department shall notify
28 the subcommittees and the senate and house fiscal agencies within
29 10 days after the approval. The notification must include the



1 amount and funding source of the additional authorization, the date
2 of the approval, and the projected use of the funds to be expended.

3 Sec. 231. (1) Federal revenues authorized by and available
4 from the federal government in excess of the appropriations in part
5 1 are appropriated and may be received and expended by the
6 department for purposes authorized under state law and subject to
7 federal requirements. The total amount of federal revenues that may
8 be received and expended under this section and section 704(3) must
9 not exceed \$45,000,000.00.

10 (2) The department shall notify the subcommittees and the
11 senate and house fiscal agencies before expending federal revenues
12 received and appropriated under subsection (1).

13 (3) If additional authorization is approved in SIGMA by the
14 state budget office under this section, the department shall notify
15 the subcommittees and the senate and house fiscal agencies within
16 10 days after the approval. The notification shall include the
17 amount and funding source of the additional authorization, the date
18 of its approval, and the projected use of the funds to be expended.

19 Sec. 232. It is the intent of the legislature that the
20 department shall take all steps necessary to protect the data and
21 privacy of citizens who are not the focus of a departmental
22 investigation and to protect personal information from unauthorized
23 access or misuse. This includes, but is not limited to, requiring
24 vendors or service providers to protect data shared with them,
25 ensuring that when personal data is collected, but no longer
26 utilized by the department, that reasonable steps be taken to
27 securely destroy records containing personal information when it is
28 to be discarded so that the information is rendered indecipherable
29 and is not sold for marketing or other purposes. In addition, the



1 department shall provide written notification to any data subject
2 whose sensitive personal information is accessed or acquired by an
3 unauthorized person.

4 Sec. 233. A law enforcement officer or a motor carrier officer
5 funded under part 1 shall not be required to issue a predetermined
6 or specified number of citations for violations of the Michigan
7 vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.1 to 257.923, or of local
8 ordinances substantially corresponding to provisions of the
9 Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.1 to 257.923, including
10 parking or standing violations. A law enforcement officer's or
11 motor carrier officer's performance evaluation system shall not
12 require a predetermined or specified number of citations to be
13 issued.

14 Sec. 234. The department shall report to the subcommittees and
15 the senate and house fiscal agencies on tentative plans for the
16 required payment of any court judgment against the department, as
17 soon as those plans are developed. The report must include, but is
18 not limited to, all of the following information:

19 (a) A listing of all known court judgments that would result
20 in a financial obligation for the department.

21 (b) The amount of time in which each of those financial
22 obligations must be met.

23 (c) The proposed budget line items from which a payment for a
24 court judgment of \$100,000.00 or more would be made.

25 (d) The estimated impact of the loss of revenue on the
26 programs funded by any line items from which payments would be
27 made.

28 Sec. 235. In collaboration with the Michigan department of
29 health and human services and the Michigan department of education,



1 the department shall advise on initiatives in schools and other
2 educational organizations that include, but are not limited to,
3 training for educators, teachers, and other personnel in school
4 settings for all of the following:

5 (a) Utilization of trauma-informed practices.

6 (b) Age-appropriate education and information on human
7 trafficking.

8 (c) Age-appropriate education and information on sexual abuse
9 prevention.

10

11 **LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES**

12 Sec. 401. (1) The department shall develop and deliver
13 professional, innovative, and quality training that supports the
14 enforcement and public safety efforts of the criminal justice
15 community.

16 (2) The department shall provide performance data, as provided
17 under section 224, for days of training being conducted by the
18 academy.

19 (3) The department shall submit a report to the subcommittees
20 and the senate and house fiscal agencies within 60 days of the
21 conclusion of any trooper, motor carrier, or state properties
22 security recruit school. The report shall include the following:

23 (a) The number of veterans and the number of MCOLES-certified
24 police officers who were admitted to and the number who graduated
25 from the recruit school.

26 (b) The total number of recruits who were admitted to the
27 school, the number of recruits who graduated from the school, and
28 the location at which each of these recruits is assigned.

29 (4) The department shall distribute and review course



1 evaluations to ensure that quality training is provided.

2 Sec. 402. (1) In accordance with applicable state and federal
3 laws and regulations, the department shall maintain and ensure
4 compliance with CJIS databases and applications in the support of
5 public safety and law enforcement communities.

6 (2) The department shall improve the accuracy, timeliness, and
7 completeness of criminal history information by conducting a
8 minimum of 30 outreach activities targeted to criminal justice
9 agencies. The department shall report the number of these outreach
10 activities conducted, as provided under section 224.

11 (3) The department shall provide for the compilation of crime
12 statistics consistent with the uniform crime reporting (UCR)
13 program and the national incident-based report system (NIBRS).

14 (4) The department shall provide for the compilation and
15 evaluation of traffic crash reports and the maintenance of the
16 state accident data collection system.

17 (5) The department shall make individual traffic crash reports
18 available for a fee of \$10.00 per incident. The department may also
19 sell an extract of electronic traffic crash data for a fee of \$0.25
20 per incident, provided that the name, address, and any other
21 personal identifying information have been excluded.

22 (6) By March 1, the department shall submit a report to the
23 subcommittees, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state
24 budget office detailing the number of traffic crash reports
25 provided, the amount of revenue collected, and all expenditures
26 incurred for activities under subsection (5) in the preceding
27 fiscal year. The report must include an analysis of whether revenue
28 from department activities under subsection (5) is sufficient to
29 offset all costs incurred for those activities and shall provide



1 information regarding any deficit or surplus of revenue.

2 (7) In accordance with applicable state and federal laws and
3 regulations, the department shall provide for the maintenance and
4 dissemination of criminal history records and juvenile records,
5 including to the extent necessary to exchange criminal history
6 records information with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and
7 other states through the interstate identification index, the
8 National Crime Information Center, and other federal CJIS databases
9 and indices.

10 (8) In accordance with applicable state and federal laws, the
11 department shall provide for the maintenance of records, including
12 criminal history records regarding firearms licensure, as provided
13 in 1927 PA 372, MCL 28.421 to 28.435.

14 (9) The department shall provide a report to the legislature
15 on concealed pistol licensing not later than January 1 that
16 includes all of the following:

17 (a) The department's actual revenue received from fees paid
18 for concealed pistol license (CPL) applications for the prior
19 fiscal year and the uses of that revenue.

20 (b) The department's prior fiscal year costs for administering
21 its concealed pistol licensing responsibilities under 1927 PA 372,
22 MCL 28.421 to 28.435, but not including costs related to the
23 administration of other state statutes or requirements of federal
24 law.

25 (10) The department shall provide information on the number of
26 background checks processed through the internet criminal history
27 access tool (ICHAT), as provided in section 224.

28 (11) The following unexpended and unencumbered revenues
29 deposited into the criminal justice information center service fees



1 shall not lapse to the general fund, but shall be carried forward
2 into the subsequent fiscal year:

3 (a) Fees for fingerprinting and criminal record checks and
4 name-based criminal record checks under 1935 PA 120, MCL 28.271 to
5 28.274.

6 (b) Fees for application and licensing for initial and renewal
7 concealed pistol licenses under 1927 PA 372, MCL 28.421 to 28.435.

8 (c) Fees for searching, copying, and providing public records
9 under the freedom of information act, 1976 PA 442, MCL 15.231 to
10 15.246.

11 (d) Revenue from other sources, including, but not limited to,
12 investment and interest earnings.

13 (12) Unexpended and unencumbered revenue generated by state
14 records management system fees shall not lapse to the general fund,
15 but shall be carried forward into the subsequent fiscal year.

16 Sec. 403. (1) The department shall provide forensic testing
17 and analysis/profiling of DNA evidence to aid in law enforcement
18 investigations in this state.

19 (2) The department shall ensure its ability to maintain
20 accreditation by a federally designated accrediting agency, as
21 provided under 34 USC 12592.

22 (3) The department shall provide forensic science services
23 with an average turnaround time of 55 days, assuming an annual
24 caseload volume commensurate with the average annual caseload
25 received by the forensic science division during the preceding 5
26 fiscal years, and shall work to achieve a goal of a 30-day average
27 turnaround time across all forensic science disciplines.

28 (4) The department shall provide the following data as
29 provided in section 224:



1 (a) The average turnaround time for processing forensic
2 evidence across all disciplines.

3 (b) Forensic laboratory staffing levels, including scientists
4 in training, and vacancies.

5 (c) The number of backlogged cases in each discipline.

6 Sec. 404. (1) The biometrics and identification division shall
7 house and manage the automated biometric identification system, the
8 statewide network of agency photographs, and combined offender DNA
9 index system biometric databases.

10 (2) The department shall provide data on the number of 10-
11 print and palm-print submissions to the database, as provided in
12 section 224.

13 (3) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
14 necessary to have a 28-day average wait time for scheduling a
15 polygraph examination, assuming an annual caseload received
16 commensurate with the average annual caseload received during the
17 preceding 5 fiscal years, with a goal of achieving a 15-day average
18 wait time.

19 (4) If changes are made to the department's protocol for
20 retaining and purging DNA analysis samples and records, the
21 department shall post a copy of the protocol changes on the
22 department's website.

23 Sec. 405. Not later than December 1, the department shall
24 submit a report to the subcommittees and senate and house fiscal
25 agencies that includes, but is not limited to, all of the following
26 information:

27 (a) Sexual assault kit analysis backlog at the beginning of
28 the prior fiscal year.

29 (b) The number of sexual assault kits collected or submitted



1 for analysis during the prior fiscal year.

2 (c) The number of sexual assault kits analyzed and the number
3 of associated DNA profiles created and uploaded during the prior
4 fiscal year.

5 (d) Sexual assault kit analysis backlog at the end of the
6 prior fiscal year.

7 (e) The average turnaround time to analyze sexual assault kits
8 and to create and upload associated DNA profiles for the prior
9 fiscal year.

10 Sec. 406. The department shall provide administrative support
11 for the following grant and community service programs:

12 (a) The operations of the automobile theft prevention
13 authority.

14 (b) Administration of the Edward Byrne memorial justice
15 assistance program and other grant programs, as well as the
16 department's community policing efforts.

17 (c) Administration of the office of school safety.

18 (d) Administration and outreach of the OK2SAY program.

19 Sec. 407. Not later than March 30, the office of school safety
20 shall provide a school safety report to the legislature and the
21 senate and house fiscal agencies that must include the following:

22 (a) Reports of incidents of school violence or threats
23 reported to the state police by local law enforcement or local
24 school districts, or received through the Michigan incident crime
25 report (MICR).

26 (b) Reports of OK2SAY-based incidences and activities.

27 (c) Based upon an evaluation of school safety incidents and
28 analysis of school safety grants, recommendations on best practices
29 and other safety measures to ensure school safety in this state.



1

2 **MICHIGAN COMMISSION ON LAW ENFORCEMENT STANDARDS**

3 Sec. 501. (1) MCOLES shall establish standards for the
4 selection, employment, training, education, licensing, and
5 licensure revocation of all law enforcement officers and provide
6 the basic law enforcement training curriculum for law enforcement
7 training academy programs statewide.

8 (2) MCOLES shall maintain staffing and resources necessary to
9 update law enforcement standards within 120 days of the enactment
10 date of any new legislation.

11 Sec. 502. The general fund/general purpose funds appropriated
12 in part 1 for the public safety officers benefit fund must be
13 deposited into the public safety officers benefit fund created in
14 section 3 of the public safety officers benefit act, 2004 PA 46,
15 MCL 28.633. All funds in the public safety officers benefit fund
16 are appropriated and available for expenditure in accordance with
17 section 3 of the public safety officers benefit act, 2004 PA 46,
18 MCL 28.633.

19

20 **FIELD SERVICES**

21 Sec. 601. (1) Department enlisted personnel who are employed
22 to enforce traffic laws as provided in section 629e of the Michigan
23 vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.629e, are not prohibited from
24 responding to crimes in progress or other emergency situations and
25 are responsible for making every effort to protect all residents of
26 this state.

27 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
28 necessary to continually work to enhance traffic safety throughout
29 this state and shall dedicate a minimum of 455,200 hours to



1 statewide patrol, of which a minimum of 40,000 shall be committed
2 to distressed cities in this state. The department shall work to
3 improve public safety efforts within distressed cities by enhancing
4 data analysis capabilities and identifying crime trends and areas
5 with high occurrence of crime.

6 (3) The department shall report on the number of residence
7 checks of registered sex offenders conducted, as provided under
8 section 224.

9 (4) The department shall submit a report on or before April 15
10 to the subcommittees and senate and house fiscal agencies regarding
11 the secure cities partnership during the prior calendar year.

12 Sec. 602. (1) The department shall identify and apprehend
13 criminals through criminal investigations in this state.

14 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
15 necessary to provide a comparable number of hours investigating
16 crimes as the average annual number provided during the preceding 5
17 fiscal years.

18 (3) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
19 necessary to annually meet or exceed a case clearance rate of 62%.

20 (4) The department shall provide training opportunities to
21 local law enforcement partners with the goal of increasing their
22 knowledge of gambling laws, legal issues, opioid-related
23 investigations, and other emerging law enforcement issues.

24 (5) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
25 necessary to investigate the average annual number of opioid-
26 related investigations conducted by multijurisdictional task forces
27 and hometown security teams during the preceding 5 fiscal years.
28 The department shall work to enhance investigative and drug
29 interdiction efforts by enhancing data analysis capabilities and



1 linking investigations among multijurisdictional task forces and
2 hometown security teams.

3 Sec. 603. (1) The department shall provide protection to this
4 state, its economy, welfare, and vital state-sponsored programs
5 through the prevention and suppression of organized smuggling of
6 untaxed tobacco products in this state, through enforcement of the
7 tobacco products tax act, 1993 PA 327, MCL 205.421 to 205.436, and
8 other laws pertaining to combating criminal activity in this state,
9 and by maintaining a tobacco tax enforcement unit.

10 (2) The department shall submit an annual report on December 1
11 to the subcommittees, the senate and house appropriations
12 subcommittees on general government, the senate and house fiscal
13 agencies, and the state budget office that details expenditures and
14 activities related to tobacco tax enforcement for the prior fiscal
15 year.

16 (3) The marijuana and tobacco investigation section shall
17 dedicate a minimum of 16,600 hours to tobacco tax enforcement.

18 Sec. 604. (1) The department shall provide fire investigation
19 training and investigative assistance to public safety agencies in
20 this state.

21 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
22 necessary to maintain readiness to respond appropriately to at
23 least the average annual number of requests for fire investigation
24 services that occurred during the preceding 5 fiscal years and
25 shall be available for call out statewide 100% of the time.

26

27 **SPECIALIZED SERVICES**

28 Sec. 701. (1) The department shall operate the Michigan
29 intelligence operations center for homeland security as this



1 state's primary federally designated fusion center to receive,
2 analyze, gather, and disseminate threat-related information among
3 federal, state, local, tribal, and private sector partners.

4 (2) The department shall ensure public safety by providing
5 public and private sector partners with timely and accurate
6 information regarding critical information key resource threats as
7 reported to or discovered by the Michigan intelligence operations
8 center for homeland security and shall increase public awareness on
9 how to report suspicious activity through website or telephone
10 communications.

11 (3) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
12 necessary to support the cyber section, including the Michigan
13 cyber command center, the computer crimes unit, and the internet
14 crimes against children task force. The department shall maintain
15 the staffing and resources necessary to complete the average annual
16 number of cases completed by the computer crimes unit during the
17 preceding 5 fiscal years. The unit shall pursue process improvement
18 initiatives to effectively utilize staff resources in providing
19 investigatory assistance and evidentiary analysis for law
20 enforcement and criminal justice agencies statewide. The department
21 shall maintain the staffing and resources necessary to complete the
22 average annual casework that the Michigan cyber command center
23 completed during the preceding 5 fiscal years.

24 (4) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
25 necessary to provide digital forensic analysis services with a goal
26 of decreasing backlogs of digital forensic analysis cases annually
27 until the department maintains a 60-day turnaround time.

28 Sec. 702. (1) The department shall provide specialized
29 services in support of, and to enhance, local, state, and federal



1 law enforcement operations within this state in accordance with all
2 applicable state and federal laws and regulations.

3 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
4 necessary to provide training to maintain readiness to respond
5 appropriately to at least the average annual number of requests for
6 specialty services which occurred during the preceding 5 fiscal
7 years.

8 (3) The canine unit shall be available for call out statewide
9 100% of the time.

10 (4) The bomb squad unit shall be available for call out
11 statewide 100% of the time.

12 (5) The emergency support teams shall be available for call
13 out statewide 100% of the time.

14 (6) The marine services team shall be available for call out
15 statewide 100% of the time.

16 (7) Aviation services shall be available for call out
17 statewide 100% of the time, unless prohibited by weather or
18 unexpected mechanical breakdowns.

19 (8) The department shall maintain the staff and resources
20 necessary to provide security services at the State Capitol Complex
21 facilities, the State Secondary Complex, and other state-owned or
22 leased properties, as provided under section 6c of 1935 PA 59, MCL
23 28.6c. The department shall also maintain the staff and resources
24 necessary to respond to emergencies at the State Capitol Complex,
25 State Secondary Complex, House Office Building, Binsfeld Office
26 Building, Capitol parking lot, Townsend Parking Ramp, Roosevelt
27 Parking Ramp, and other areas as directed. The department shall
28 maintain a goal of annually conducting 35,000 property inspections
29 of state owned and leased facilities.



1 Sec. 703. (1) The department shall maintain commercial vehicle
2 regulation, school bus inspections, and enforcement activities,
3 including enforcement of requirements concerning size, weight, and
4 load restrictions; operating authority; registration; fuel taxes;
5 transportation of hazardous materials; operations of new entrants;
6 commercial driver licenses; and inspections pursuant to the federal
7 motor carrier assistance program.

8 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
9 necessary to meet inspection goals consistent with the department's
10 federal motor carrier assistance program activities.

11 (3) Revenue collected under the motor carrier act, 1933 PA
12 254, MCL 475.1 to 479.42, shall be expended in accordance with that
13 act. Unexpended and unencumbered revenues shall not lapse to the
14 general fund but shall be carried forward into the subsequent
15 fiscal year.

16 Sec. 704. (1) The department shall coordinate the mitigation,
17 preparation, response, and recovery activities of municipal,
18 county, state, and federal governments, and other governmental
19 entities, for all hazards, disasters, and emergencies.

20 (2) The state director of emergency management may expend
21 money appropriated under part 1 to call upon any agency or
22 department of the state or any resource of the state to protect
23 life or property or to provide for the health or safety of the
24 population in any area of this state in which the governor
25 proclaims a state of emergency or state of disaster under the
26 emergency management act, 1976 PA 390, MCL 30.401 to 30.421. The
27 state director of emergency management may expend the amounts the
28 director considers necessary to accomplish these purposes. The
29 director shall submit to the state budget director, as soon as



1 possible, a complete report of all actions taken under the
2 authority of this section. The report shall contain, as a separate
3 item, a statement of all money expended that is not reimbursable
4 from federal funding. The state budget director shall review the
5 expenditures and submit recommendations to the legislature in
6 regard to any possible need for a supplemental appropriation.

7 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, the
8 department may receive and expend money from local, private,
9 federal, or state sources for the purpose of providing emergency
10 management training to local or private interests and for the
11 purpose of supporting emergency preparedness, response, recovery,
12 and mitigation activity. If additional expenditure authorization in
13 SIGMA is approved by the state budget office under this section,
14 the department and the state budget office shall notify the
15 subcommittees and the senate and house fiscal agencies within 10
16 days after the approval. The notification shall include the amount
17 and source of the additional authorization, the date of its
18 approval, and the projected use of the funds to be expended under
19 the authorization. The total amount of federal revenues that may be
20 received and expended under this section and section 231 must not
21 exceed \$45,000,000.00. The total amount of state restricted
22 revenues that may be received and expended under this subsection
23 and subsection (7) must not exceed \$15,000,000.00.

24 (4) The department shall foster, promote, and maintain
25 partnerships to protect this state and homeland from all hazards.

26 (5) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
27 necessary to do all of the following:

28 (a) Serve approximately 105 local emergency management
29 preparedness programs and 88 local emergency planning committees in



1 this state.

2 (b) Operate and maintain the state's emergency operations
3 center and provide command and control in support of emergency
4 response services.

5 (c) Maintain readiness, including training and equipment to
6 respond to civil disorders and natural disasters commensurate with
7 the capabilities of fiscal year 2010-2011.

8 (d) Perform hazardous materials response training.

9 (6) The department shall conduct a minimum of 3 training
10 sessions to enhance safe response in the event of natural or
11 manmade incidents, emergencies, or disasters.

12 (7) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
13 appropriated from the disaster and emergency contingency fund an
14 amount necessary to cover costs related to any disaster or
15 emergency as defined in the emergency management act, 1976 PA 390,
16 MCL 30.401 to 30.421. However, funds appropriated under this
17 subsection and state restricted funds received and expended under
18 subsection (3) must not exceed \$15,000,000.00. Funds shall be
19 expended as provided under sections 18 and 19 of the emergency
20 management act, 1976 PA 390, MCL 30.418 and 30.419, and R 30.51 to
21 R 30.61 of the Michigan Administrative Code.

22 (8) Funds in the disaster and emergency contingency fund shall
23 not be expended unless the state budget director approves the
24 expenditure and the department and the state budget office notify
25 the senate and house appropriations committees. If expenditures are
26 made from the disaster and emergency contingency fund during a
27 month, the department shall submit monthly reports to the senate
28 and house fiscal agencies detailing the purpose of the
29 expenditures. These monthly reports shall be submitted within 30



1 days after the end of the month during which funds from the
2 disaster and emergency contingency fund were expended.

3 (9) Upon the declaration of a state of emergency or disaster
4 by the governor under section 3 of the emergency management act,
5 1976 PA 390, MCL 30.403, approval of the state budget director, and
6 notification of the subcommittees and senate and house fiscal
7 agencies, the director may expend funds appropriated from any
8 source to any line item within part 1 for the purpose of paying the
9 necessary and reasonable expenses incurred by the department in
10 responding to or mitigating the effects of any emergency or
11 disaster as those terms are defined in section 2 of the emergency
12 management act, 1976 PA 390, MCL 30.402.

13 (10) The department shall track and report on a biannual
14 basis, as provided in section 224 of this part, the status of the
15 department's assessment of critical infrastructure vulnerabilities,
16 including the protection status of critical infrastructure items
17 identified by the assessment. The department is not required to
18 report any information that could compromise the security of any
19 critical infrastructure.

20 Sec. 705. The department shall provide for the planning,
21 administration, and implementation of highway traffic safety
22 programs to save lives and reduce injuries on roads in this state,
23 in partnership with other public and private organizations.

24 Sec. 706. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for the secondary
25 road patrol program shall be used to provide grants to sheriffs
26 under the secondary road patrol program described under section 76
27 of 1846 RS 14, MCL 51.76.

28 (2) The sheriffs' duties under the secondary road patrol
29 program, as outlined in section 76(2) of 1846 RS 14, MCL 51.76, are



1 to patrol and monitor traffic violations; to enforce the criminal
2 laws of this state, violations of which are observed by or brought
3 to the attention of the sheriff's department while patrolling and
4 monitoring secondary roads; to investigate accidents involving
5 motor vehicles; and to provide emergency assistance to persons on
6 or near a highway or road the sheriff is patrolling and monitoring.
7
