The fiscal year 2020-2021 appropriations are anticipated to be the same as those for fiscal year 2019-2020, except that the amounts will be adjusted for changes in retirement costs, caseload and related costs, federal fund match rates, economic factors, and available revenue. These adjustments will be determined after the January 2020 consensus revenue estimating conference.
