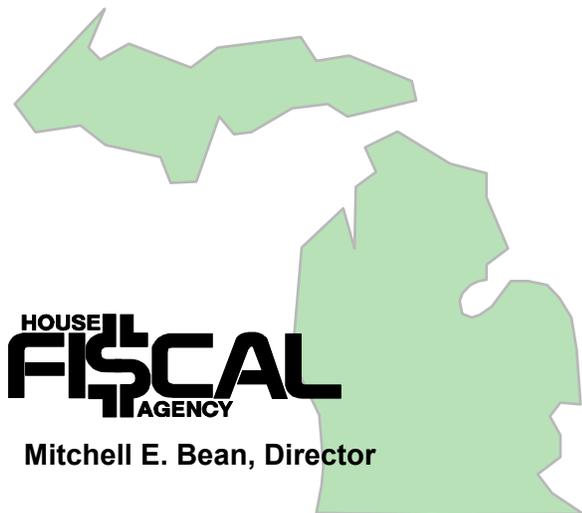

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GLOSSARY

STATE BUDGET TERMS

Gross Appropriations (Gross): The total of all applicable appropriations (statutory spending authorizations) in a budget bill.

Adjusted Gross Appropriations (Adjusted Gross): The net amount of all gross appropriations after subtracting interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs).

Lapses: Appropriation amounts that are unspent/unobligated at the end of a fiscal year. Appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless otherwise provided by law.

Work Project: A statutorily-authorized account which allows a spending authorization to be carried over from one fiscal year to a succeeding fiscal year or years—i.e., allows funds to be spent over a period of years.

APPROPRIATION BILL TERMS

Line Item: Specific funding amount in an appropriation bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function (may be for a single purpose or for multiple purposes).

Boilerplate: Specific language sections in an appropriation bill which direct, limit or restrict line item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

REVENUE SOURCES

General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP): Unrestricted General Fund revenue available to fund any activity accounted for in the General Fund; unused GF/GP revenue lapses to the General Fund at the end of a fiscal year.

State Restricted (Restricted): State revenue restricted by state law or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; at year-end, unused restricted revenue remains in the restricted fund.

Federal Revenue: Federal grant or matchable revenue dedicated to specific programs.

Local Revenue: Revenue from local units of government.

Private Revenue: Revenue from non-government entities: rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals or individuals, and gifts and bequests.

Interdepartmental Grant (IDG): Revenue or funds received by one state department from another state department (usually for a service provided by the receiving department).

Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT): Transfers or funds being provided from one appropriation unit to another in the same department.

MAJOR STATE FUNDS

Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF): The countercyclical economic and budget stabilization fund; also known as the "rainy day" fund.

School Aid Fund (SAF): A restricted fund; the primary funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts (ISDs).

General Fund: The General Fund (funded from taxes and other general revenue) is used to account for the ordinary operations of a governmental unit that are not accounted for in another fund.

The mission of the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) is to protect and enhance the state's environmental quality.

The Environmental Science and Services Division provides assistance to Michigan businesses and municipalities, public agencies, and the public to encourage environmental protection efforts. The Division emphasizes pollution prevention and provides four main program efforts: financial assistance, technical assistance, pollution prevention, and education programs.

The Office of Geological Survey regulates development of Michigan's oil, gas, and mineral resources, to provide for managed and orderly development of geological resources while protecting other natural resources, the environment, and public health and safety. Also develops and disseminates maps, publications, and data on oil, gas, mineral, and groundwater resources for industrial and public use.

SECTION 108: WASTE AND HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

The Waste and Hazardous Materials Division is responsible for the regulation and disposal of hazardous and non-hazardous solid and liquid wastes, scrap tires, radioactive materials, and for the land application of processed solid waste. The Division administers the solid waste management program, radiological protection program, and medical waste regulation program; registers disposal facilities and waste transporters; and regulates the design, construction, and operation of above-ground and underground storage tanks. Grant funds are provided for cleanup and disposal of abandoned scrap tires, development of markets for scrap tires, and indoor radon education and testing.

SECTION 109: WATER

The Water Division protects and enhances the water quality of the state's surface waters, including the Great Lakes. The Division administers several programs which establish water quality standards and assess water quality, issues permits to regulate the discharge of industrial and municipal waste waters, monitors compliance with state and federal laws, provides oversight and technical consultation for local water supply inspection programs, and provides technical and financial assistance to watershed management councils.

Defines abbreviations used in this act for federal fund sources.

Sec. 204. Civil Service Charges

Requires Department of Civil Service to charge state departments 1% of salary payments.

Sec. 205. State Hiring Freeze

Requires report identifying and justifying exceptions to the state hiring freeze.

Sec. 206. Reports on Internet

Requires reports to be put on the Internet.

Sec. 207. Report Retention

Requires copies of all reports funded through this act to be received and provided for public use, following state and federal guidelines.

Sec. 208. Restricted Fund Revenue, Expenditures, and Fund Balances

Requires report on fund revenue, spending, and estimated year-end balance for each restricted fund appropriated in the act.

Sec. 209. Department Grant and Loan Programs

Requires report with description of available grant and loan programs, criteria for awards, and list of recipients.

Sec. 210. Consolidated Report on Environmental Cleanup Projects

Requires status report on approved cleanup projects funded through environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup, emergency actions, superfund cleanup, revitalization revolving loan program, Brownfield grants and loans, leaking underground storage tank cleanup program, contaminated lake and river cleanup program, and environmental protection bond projects.

Sec. 211. Appropriations for Environmental Cleanup Projects

Re-appropriates unspent cleanup and redevelopment fund, and leaking underground storage tank, bottle deposits fund, and Clean Michigan Initiative bond response activities funding for expenditure for any site listed in an appropriation act.

Sec. 212. Michigan Youth Conservation Council

Includes environmental education appropriation of \$5,000 for MSU Extension Service 4-H programs for the Michigan Youth Conservation Council.

Sec. 213. Information Services User Fees

Directs DEQ to pay fees following service rate schedules for standard services and information system support, subject to the interdepartmental agreement.

Sec. 214. Information Technology Appropriation Work Project

Designates appropriated funds for information technology as a work project.

Sec. 215. Out-of-State Travel Report

Requires annual report on employee out-of-state travel expenses.

Sec. 216. American Made Goods and Services

Urges DEQ to purchase American-made goods and services if they are of comparable quality.

Sec. 217. Firms in Economically Deprived or Depressed Communities

Encourages DEQ to enter into contracts with vendors located in economically depressed communities.

Sec. 218. Settlement Fund Revenue Carryforward

Allows carryforward of up to \$2.5 million of settlement fund revenue into FY 2009-10.

Sec. 219. Restricted Fund Allocation Plan for Administrative Units

Requires DEQ to develop cost allocation plan for DEQ administrative units, including information technology.

Sec. 220. Prohibition of Disciplinary Actions For Legislative Contacts

Provides that state employees who communicate with the Michigan Legislature shall not be disciplined.

Sec. 221. Criminal and Civil Fine Revenue

Requires report of criminal and civil fine revenue collected during FY 2007-08.

Sec. 223. Rule Promulgation

Requires a report on any policy changes made to implement a public act; DEQ is not allowed to adopt a rule that will apply to a small business if it has a disproportionate economic impact.

Sec. 224. Legal Services

Denies permission for DEQ to hire attorney to provide legal services provided by the Attorney General.

Sec. 225. Contingency Fund Transfer Authority

Allows legislative transfers: up to \$30.0 million federal, \$5.0 million restricted, \$100,000 local, and \$100,000 private.

Sec. 226. Out-of-State State Employee Training

Stipulates that only one state employee may participate in training seminars or professional development conference, unless paid by non-state funds or multiple issues outside of a participants area of expertise are addressed.

Sec. 227. Obsolete Database Systems

Requires a plan and cost estimate to replace obsolete or failing computer or database systems.

Sec. 228. Expenditure Reports: FY 2008-09

Requires a report of DEQ expenditures in a publicly accessible internet site including the purpose for which the expenditures were made, if funding is available.

Sec. 229. Freedom of Information Requests

Requires semiannual reports on freedom of information requests presented to DEQ.

Sec. 230. Muskrat Lake Water Levels

Requires the issuance of permits to construct a lake level control structure on Muskrat Lake in Clinton County.

Sec. 231. Environmental Ombudsman – VETOED

Provides funding contingent on passage of legislation creating the position of Environmental Ombudsman in the Legislative Council; states legislative intent to review citizen complaints related to the wetlands program.

Sec. 401. Laboratory Services Revenue Carryforward

Allows carryforward of unspent interdepartmental laboratory revenue.

Sec. 402. Bond Fund Report

Requires report of amount/disposition of bond funds and descriptions of activities supported from bond revenue.

Sec. 403. Reverse Vending Machine Retrofits – VETOED

Funds retrofitting existing reverse vending machines to accept Michigan-only returnable beverage containers.

Sec. 501. WMU Geologic Core Research Laboratory

States legislative intent that the Office of Geological Survey work with Western Michigan University to maintain the Michigan basin core research laboratory and to collaborate on other cooperative projects.

Sec. 701. Work Projects – Environmental Response Programs

Considers appropriations for emergency cleanup action to be a work project.

Sec. 702. Peer-Reviewed Site Cleanup Criteria

Directs DEQ to include cleanup criteria in remedial action plans derived from peer-reviewed risk assessments.

Sec. 703. Refined Petroleum Cleanup Site List

Lists cleanup projects funded through the refined petroleum cleanup program.

Sec. 704. Refined Petroleum Fund

States legislative intent to restore \$70.0 million Refined Petroleum Fund transferred to General Fund in FY 2006-07.

Sec. 705. Administrative Rules Advisory Workgroup

Establishes a work group on use of administrative rules and operational memoranda in the leaking underground storage tank program.

Sec. 706. Operational Memoranda

Bans the use of operational memoranda for selected programs.

Sec. 801. Construction Permit Site Review Board

States legislative intent that approval by the Site Review Board represents the final approval for construction permit applications referred by DEQ.

Sec. 901. Water Quality Enforcement Report

Requires report on enforcement and program activities funded from National Pollution Discharge Elimination System Fund.

Sec. 902. Contaminated Lake and River Sediments Cleanup Funding

Re-appropriates Clean Michigan Initiative funding for the Contaminated Lake and River Sediments Cleanup program.

Sec. 903. Michigan Agriculture Environmental Assurance Program

States legislative intent that DEQ and Department of Agriculture should proportionally reduce their programs if federal funding is less than that received in FY 2007-08.

Sec. 1101. Septage Waste Compliance Program Grants

Allows DEQ to provide county septage waste compliance services if a certified health department does not exist, or if the county health department fails to fulfill mandated responsibilities.

Sec. 1102. Scrap Tire Fire Suppression Costs

Provides \$100,000 for grants to communities for scrap tire suppression costs, provided that owner liability bonds and other available funding sources have been exhausted.

Sec. 1103. Real-Time Water Quality Monitoring

Provides grant to Macomb County and St. Clair County to support real-time water quality monitoring programs in the St. Clair watershed.

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
