






Budget FY22

FY22 Appropriations


Total: \$661.25M

Vocational Rehabilitation



Provides individualized, specialized services to assist individuals with disabilities in becoming employed in a career, retaining employment and career advancement based on their current or potential skills and abilities in demand-driven occupations. Provides diagnostic evaluations and vocational counseling.

Michigan Career & Technical Institute

24/7 residential facility that allows participants to learn workforce readiness skills, attend training classes, and explore vocational goals.

BSBP Training Center

24/7 residential vocational rehabilitation training center focused on instruction in adjustment to blindness that prepares individuals for workplace readiness and exploration on vocational goals.

Training and licenses for 42 blind persons to manage food service operations in state and federal buildings and rest stops (147 sites).
