

Mental Health Courts

Mental health courts are governed by the Revised Judicature Act, 1961 PA 236, sections 1090 through 1099m. Mental health courts are supervised treatment programs for individuals who are diagnosed by a mental health professional with having a serious mental illness, serious emotional disturbance, co-occurring disorder, or developmental disability. Goals of mental health courts include successful completion of the program, improvement in employment status or education level, improvement in mental health, improvement in quality of life, medication compliance, and reduced recidivism. Mental health courts are required to adhere to 10 essential elements promulgated by the federal Bureau of Justice Assistance.
