- We license and regulate nearly 2 million individuals and entities

FY 2022 Statewide Budget Priorities

The Governor's FY 2022 budget is focused on:

- Keeping families safe and healthy
- Providing assistance to small businesses and the unemployed affected by the pandemic

LARA Accomplishments

Bureau of Community and Health Systems (BCHS)

- Completed over 1,150 unannounced federal infection control surveys of the 446 federally certified nursing homes
- Conducted 172 announced state infection control surveys and partnered with DHHS to provide additional training and education on maintaining infection control practices

Bureau of Professional Licensing (BPL)

Efficiently processed licensing applications of health professionals

LARA Accomplishments

Liquor Control Commission (LCC)

 Liquor Buyback Program provided more than \$3.3 million in financial relief to 657 bar and restaurant owners across the state

Michigan Indigent Defense Commission (MIDC)

• Standard 5 approval granted by the LARA Director as an important step forward in indigent defense reform





Highlights

- Investing in clean energy improvements for businesses and residents
- Extending efforts to conduct infection control surveys in skilled nursing home facilities
- Supporting local court compliance with MIDC Standards 1-5
- Modernizing IT systems for critical licensing programs
- Enhancing Michigan's growing marihuana industry
- Promoting Underground Natural Gas Storage Safety

Michigan Saves Green Bank

- \$5.0 million GF/GP one-time funding to leverage private investment in clean energy improvements for Michigan's residents and businesses
 - Provides a credit enhancement to lenders
 - Incentivizes lenders to provide more favorable rates and terms for renewable energy improvements
- This investment will benefit property owners and the environment while supporting Michigan's clean energy economy
 - Increased safety and health protections
 - A cleaner environment
 - More resilient energy generation

Nursing Home Infection Control

- \$1.1 million GF/GP one-time funding to continue state efforts in conducting infection control surveys, education, and consultation at our skilled nursing home facilities
 - Public Act 123 of 2020, authorized \$1.4 million in federal funding for limitedterm BCHS staff to conduct state infection control surveys in skilled nursing facilities
- Additional GF/GP funding will support these limited term positions and allow for the program to extend beyond the current fiscal year through the end of FY 2022

Michigan Indigent Defense Commission

- \$31.4 million additional GF/GP to support local compliance grants
 - Standards 1-4 (\$19.4M) approved cost of local compliance plans
 - Standard 5 (\$12.0M) ensures independence of public defense system
- Total FY 2022 funding for compliance with all MIDC standards is estimated at \$148.9 million
 - Standards 1-4 is projected to be \$136.9 million
 - Standard 5 is projected to be \$12.0 million

Information Technology Modernization

- \$6.0 million ITIF funding (DTMB budget) to update the licensing platform for two critical BCHS programs:
 - Certification and Training of Nurse Aides (\$3.1 million)
 - State Licensing of Health Facilities (\$2.9 million)
- BCHS currently relies on the outdated and unsupported software application, called License 2000 (L2K)
- In addition, effective January 2023, the server platform necessary to run the L2K software application will no longer be supported by Microsoft

Information Technology Modernization (continued)

- The security accreditation process uncovered a significant number of unresolvable findings with the current system
- DTMB Michigan Cyber Security division required LARA to formally accept the risks associated with using an unsupported application
- Data contained within this system is critical to protect the safety, health, and welfare of Michigan's residents

Marijuana Regulatory Agency

- \$500,000 (state restricted) for the Marihuana Social Equity Program
 - Provides support to address social equity within the marihuana industry through access to affordable capital
 - Funding will provide low and no-interest loans and grants for businesses to open or expand in the adult-use market

- \$648,000 (state restricted) to increase marihuana inspection activities
 - Supports increased costs for regulation and inspection in the adult-use market

Underground Natural Gas Storage Safety

- \$352,500 (federal) to inspect, evaluate, and determine code compliance for underground natural storage operators in Michigan
 - This funding reflects a new federal grant for FY 2022
 - An FY 2021 supplemental request is also recommended as LARA anticipates receiving the grant during the current fiscal year

Boilerplate Changes

• LARA's budget includes boilerplate language that provides for consolidated reporting of program data and eliminates redundancy
