**RE**: Legislative Transfer Package 2023-3

Attached are legislative transfers proposed by the State Budget Office in a letter dated March 23, 2023, 2023. Pursuant to section 393 of the Management and Budget Act, a legislative transfer must be approved by a majority of both the House and Senate Appropriations Committees, with identical funding sources and dollar amounts, in order to become effective.

There are two basic types of legislative transfers, which have different effects on the overall level of appropriations in the state budget.

A **standard legislative transfer** shifts existing spending authorization between line items in a particular budget area, with no net change in total appropriations. Generally, such transfers are proposed when expenditures are higher than originally anticipated in one line item and lower than anticipated in another. These transfers can represent a shift of GF/GP funding between two line items, or merely a shift of spending authorization from same broad category of funding (federal, restricted, etc.) between the line items.

As shown in the attached table, standard transfers in this package total \$22.2 million, which will shift 0.03% of total appropriations within the existing FY 2022-23 year-to-date state budget.

A **contingency fund transfer** increases total line item appropriations in a budget area by moving contingency spending authorization from the boilerplate section of a budget act to a specific line item in order to recognize additional federal, private, local, or state restricted revenue that has become available since the original enactment of the budget. Absent the contingency fund transfer mechanism, this type of budget adjustment would be made through a supplemental appropriation bill.

As shown in the attached table, contingency fund transfers in this package total \$22.0 million, which will increase the FY 2022-23 year-to-date state budget by 0.03%.

This transfer would shift \$1.4 million in state restricted Agriculture Equine Industry Development Fund (AEIDF) spending authority from line items intended for thoroughbred and light horse racing programs to line items that provide purses and purse supplements for standardbred horse racing. The transfer nets to \$0.

The thoroughbred and light horse racing line items have not been used since FY 2016-17. This is because there have been no eligible thoroughbred or light horse racing programs since Hazel Park racetrack closed in April 2018. Since the closure of Hazel Park racetrack, there has been only one race meeting licensee, (racetrack) in Michigan, Northville Downs, which offers live standardbred harness racing and simulcast wagering under a license granted by the Michigan Gaming Control Board. The *Standardbred sire stakes* and the *Standardbred purses and supplements – licensed tracks* line items support purses for specific standardbred racing events at Northville Downs. Several county fairs in Michigan offer standardbred racing. Funding in support of county fair standardbred racing programs is made in the *Purses and supplements – fairs/licensed tracks* line item. In 2022, 13 fairs offered standardbred horse racing as one of the fair events. Note that county fair racing is not licensed and there is no legal wagering on the results of county fair racing.

The transfer would bring FY 2022-23 AEIDF support for standardbred racing programs to \$3.4 million, \$600,000 less than FY 2021-22 when \$4.0 million was expended on standardbred racing programs. It should be noted that the FY 2021-22 expenditures for standardbred programs included \$2.3 million in GF/GP revenue.

The Stronger Connections Program was appropriated in the FY 2022-23 School Aid Supplemental recently signed into law (2023 PA 3, \$27.9 million). Under federal guidelines, the state is allowed to use up to 5% of the award for administrative expenses. This contingency authorization transfer request provides additional authorization to the administrative line in the department for the program office administering this program. Federal contingency authorization is available in accordance with 2022 PA 166, Article 3, Section 211(1).

This transfer would shift \$500,000 in private contingency authorization to the Cancer Prevention and Control Program line item. The federal cancer prevention and control grant funding is less than currently authorized and this transfer would use unallocated Amanda's Fund for Breast Cancer Prevention and Treatment fund balance to partially offset the federal reduction and maintain current levels of service. This request would transfer \$225,000 of state restricted contingency authorization to the Motorcycle Safety Education Administration line item to expand the department's media campaign on motorcycle safety and dangerous intersections to the Lansing and Kalamazoo areas. The transfer of contingency authorization would provide for the use of a portion of the balance of the Motorcycle Safety and Education Awareness Fund that has grown over the past several years from unexpended balances carrying forward. A balance of \$623,800 carried forward from FY 2021-22 to FY 2022-23. Motorcycle Safety and Education Awareness Fund receives a portion of driver's license motorcycle endorsement renewal fees. State restricted contingency funds are available in accordance with 2022 PA 166, Article 5, Section 701(2).

Historically, a portion of Michigan Department of Transportation Design & Engineering staffing costs have been charged to capital projects funded in the State Trunkline Road and Bridge Construction line item. However, an increasing share of those costs can no longer be allocated to federal aid eligible projects. This transfer addresses this problem. This transfer would shift federal and state restricted State Trunkline Fund (STF) revenue between operating line items within the Design and Engineering Services appropriation unit and the capital State Trunkline Road and Bridge Construction line item. Specifically, the transfer would shift \$10.0 million in federal-aid authorization from Design and Engineering Services lines to the capital State Trunkline Road and Bridge Construction line item. At the same time, the transfer would shift \$10.0 million in STF spending authorization from the State Trunkline Road and Bridge Construction line item to Design and Engineering Services line items.

The net effect of the transfer is \$0 – both in total and with respect to the line items affected. The transfer simply adjusts the sources of funding between line items – federal aid and STF. The Governor's proposed FY 2023-24 budget includes a similar realignment of fund sources between Design and Engineering operating line items and the capital State Trunkline Road and Bridge Construction line item. These adjustments affect only the internal structure of the budget and not actual funds available for the capital trunkline road and bridge construction program.

This transfer shifts \$20.0 million of federal contingency authorization to the Airport Safety, Protection, and Improvement line item. The increase in federal spending authority is primarily to recognize additional federal funds available to Michigan airports through the Congressionally directed Community Programs: \$12.8 million is the total of four congressional earmarks for specific airport projects:

- Kalamazoo/Battle Creek International Airport, \$1.5 million
- Grand Rapids (Gerald R. Ford International Airport), \$1.3 million
- Lansing (Capital Region International Airport), \$8.2 million
- Big Rapids (Roben-Hood Airport), \$1.8 million

The remaining \$7.2 million of the increase represents the Michigan Department of Transportation's estimate of competitively awarded funding to Michigan from recently announced increases of supplemental discretionary funding available from the Federal Aviation Administration.
