RE: Legislative Transfer Package 2021-6

Attached are legislative transfers proposed by the State Budget Office in a letter dated November 2, 2021. Pursuant to section 393 of the Management and Budget Act, a legislative transfer must be approved by a majority of both the House and Senate Appropriations Committees, with identical funding sources and dollar amounts, in order to become effective. This transfer package will be considered by the House Appropriations Committee on Wednesday, November 10, 2021.

There are two basic types of legislative transfers, which have different effects on the overall level of appropriations in the state budget.

A **standard legislative transfer** shifts existing spending authorization between line items in a particular budget area, with no net change in total appropriations. Generally, such transfers are proposed when expenditures are higher than originally anticipated in one line item and lower than anticipated in another. These transfers can represent a shift of GF/GP funding between two line items, or merely a shift of spending authorization from same broad category of funding (federal, restricted, etc.) between the line items.

As shown in the attached table, standard transfers in this package total \$136.3 million, which will shift 0.018% of total appropriations within the existing FY 2020-21 year-to-date state budget.

A **contingency fund transfer** increases total line item appropriations in a budget area by moving contingency spending authorization from the boilerplate section of a budget act to a specific line item in order to recognize additional federal, private, local, or state restricted revenue that has become available since the original enactment of the budget. Absent the contingency fund transfer mechanism, this type of budget adjustment would be made through a supplemental appropriation bill.

As shown in the attached table, contingency fund transfers in this package total \$26.7 million, which will increase the FY 2020-21 year-to-date state budget by 0.04%.

This request to transfer \$2.1 million in available GF/GP from the Special Alternative Incarceration Program line item to the Worker's Compensation line item will provide the additional funding necessary to cover an increase in costs for worker's compensation claims. Costs are higher than anticipated due to COVID-19 and a significant increase in claims submitted by department employees that contracted the virus. From January 1, 2020, to September 30, 2021, roughly 2,700 worker's compensation claims related to COVID-19 were filed by department employees. This number represents 70% of all claims filed during this time period and over 50% of all claim costs. This resulted in an increase of roughly \$4.3 million in worker's compensation costs over the previous fiscal year. The existing appropriation for worker's compensation was able to absorb a significant portion of the increased costs. The transfer is requested to cover the remaining costs.

Funding is available from the Special Alternative Incarceration Program line item which has unspent funds due to ongoing efficiencies from moving the program into the Cooper Street Correctional Facility and due to reduced census at various times during the fiscal year due to COVID-19. The transfer is requested to complete the FY 2020-21 book closing process.

This transfer provides a total of \$20.0 million in contingency authorization (\$15.0 million federal, \$5.0 million state restricted) to the Unemployment Insurance Agency (UIA) line item to cover contractor costs from work done during the COVID-19 pandemic because of the high volume of unemployment claims. Contractors provided UIA with a range of supports including call center support, fraud detection, and other assistance on fraud and adjudication. US Department of Labor has provided additional above-base federal funding to UIA to support these increased expenditures, and UIA has sufficient federal revenue to support the federal contingency fund transfer. An additional \$5.0 million in state restricted authorization from the Penalty & Interest Fund will fund expenditures that the federal revenues cannot. There is sufficient Penalty & Interest Fund revenue to support these additional expenditures.

This legislative transfer request would shift \$2.2 million between state restricted funding sources in the Information Technology Services and Projects (IT) line item, pursuant to the Management and Budget Act (MCL 18.1393). This adjustment is necessary to align expenditures from various state restricted fund sources to support ongoing maintenance costs of IT projects in several department bureaus. Revenues are available in each of the necessary funds to support the costs, and excess authority is available in multiple fund sources due to savings from decreased maintenance costs associated with the L2K/My License system and vacancies within DTMB.
