HISTORY

- Established in 1965 (P.A. 203)
- Michigan Law Enforcement Officers Training Council (MLEOTC)
 - Original Mission Statement of MLEOTC
 - “...to make available to all local jurisdictions, however remote, the advantages of superior employee selection and training...”



HISTORY

- Executive Reorganization Order 2001-2 (MCL 28.621)
 - Merged the membership of the Michigan Justice Training Commission (MJTC) into the Michigan Law Enforcement Officers Training Council creating MCOLES
 - Reiterated MCOLES' continued statutory responsibilities under 1965 PA 203
 - Transferred all the powers and duties of the MJTC to MCOLES as codified in 1982 PA 302
 - Assigned additional responsibilities to MCOLES intended to increase the professionalism of law enforcement through standards and training

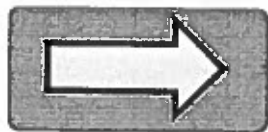

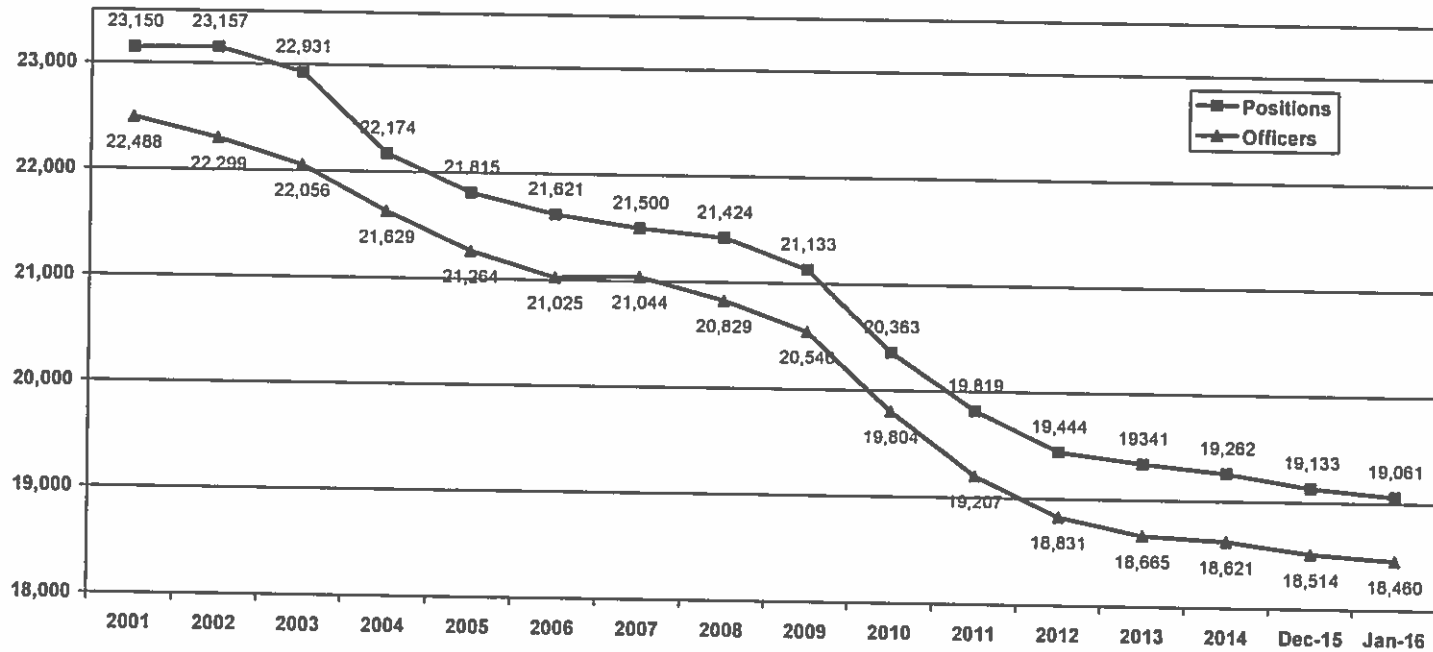

- Reimbursements to local units of government for basic training

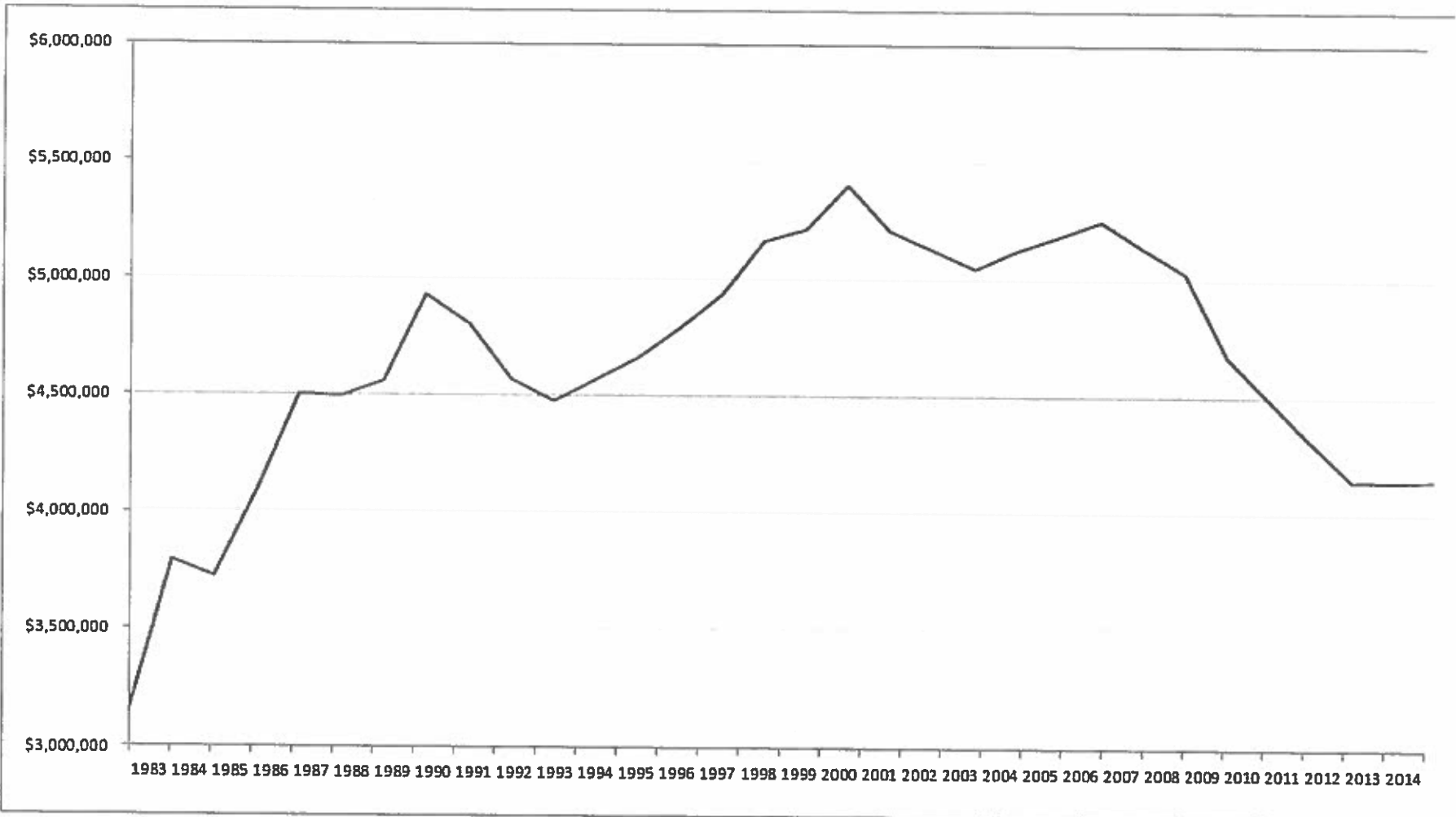
Public Safety Officer Benefits Program (MCL 28.631-638)

- Financial award to survivors of Public Safety Officers killed in the line of duty



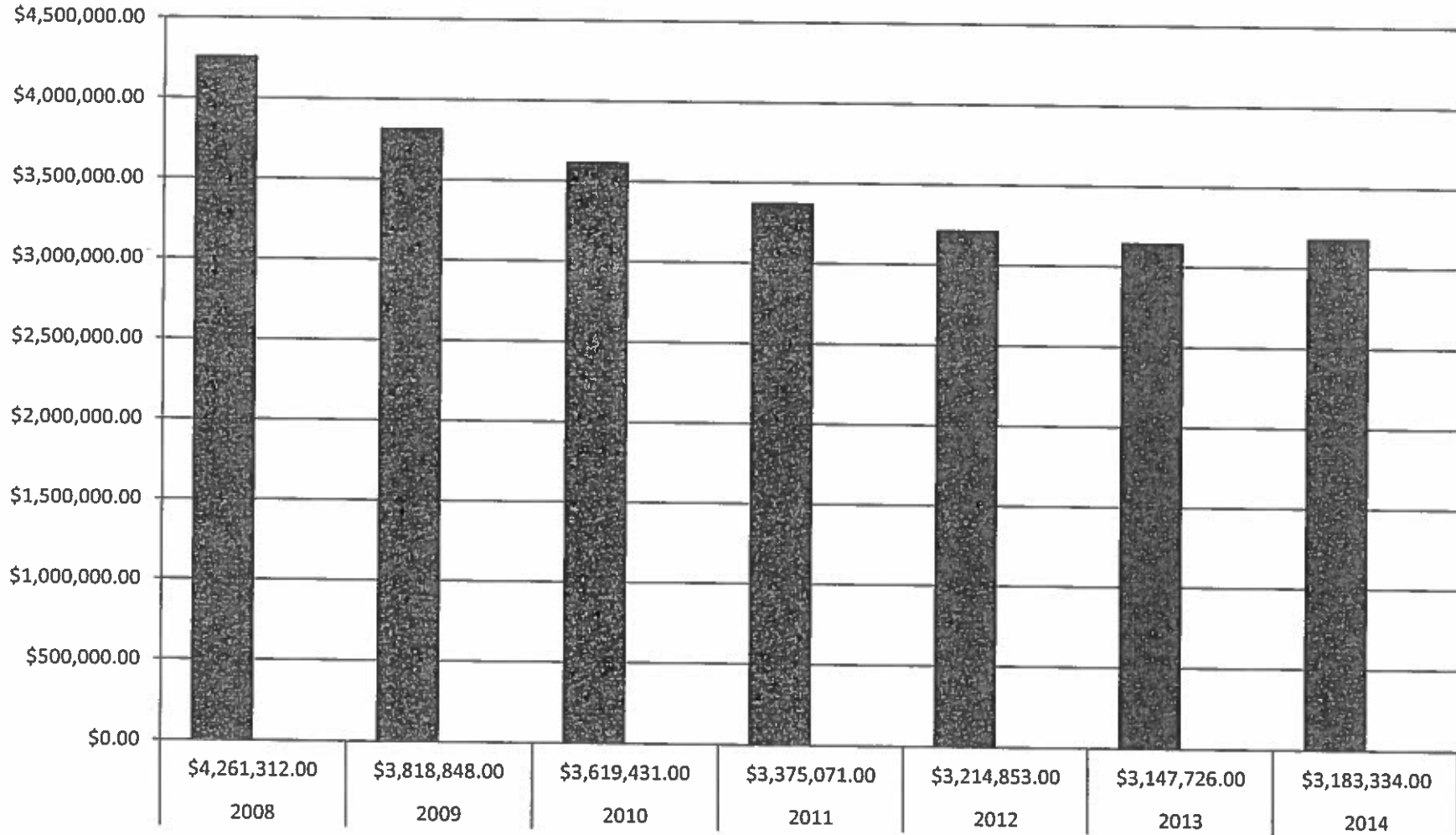
DECLINING REVENUE

Michigan Justice Training Fund 1983 - 2014



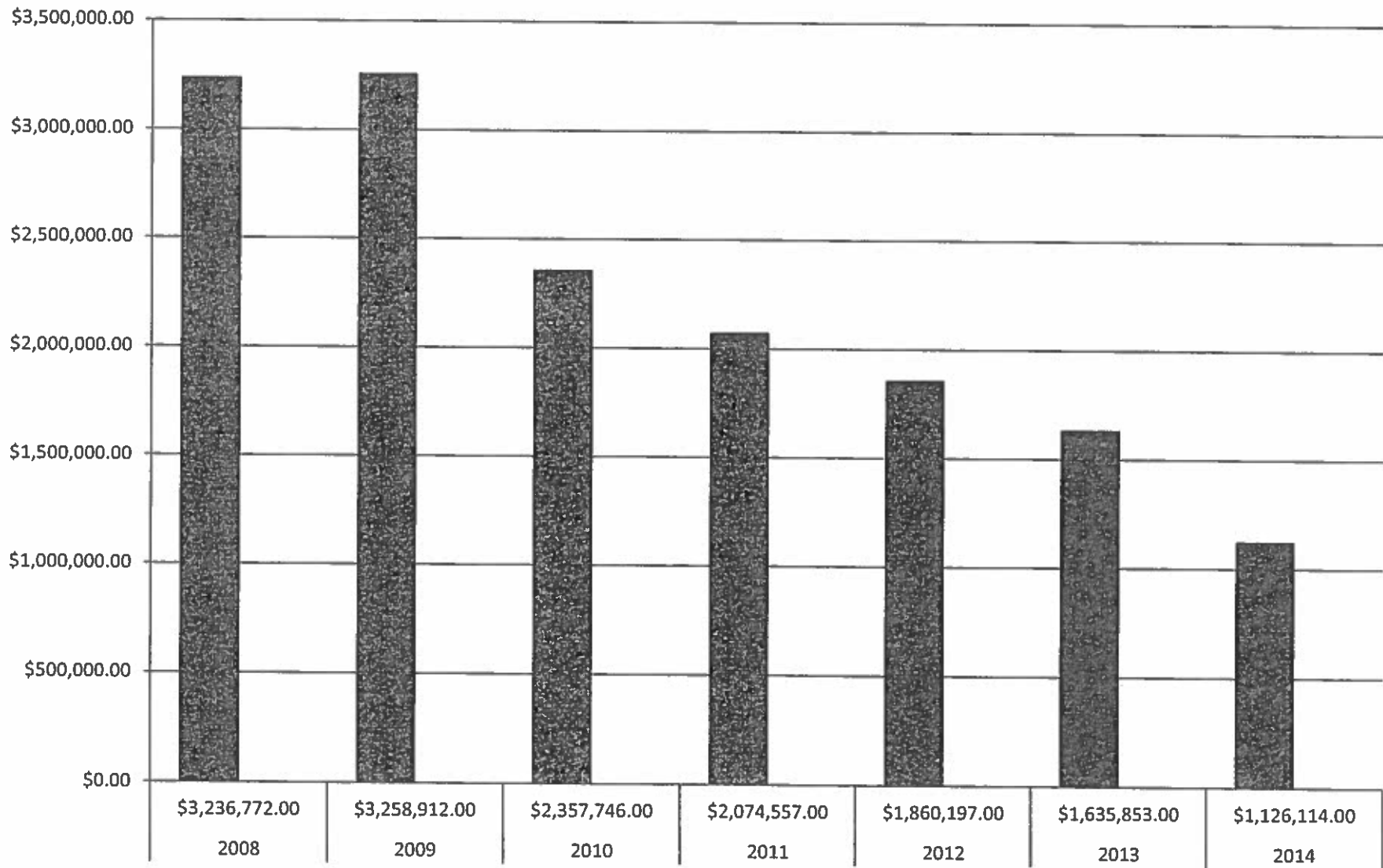


LAW ENFORCEMENT DISTRIBUTION 2008-2014



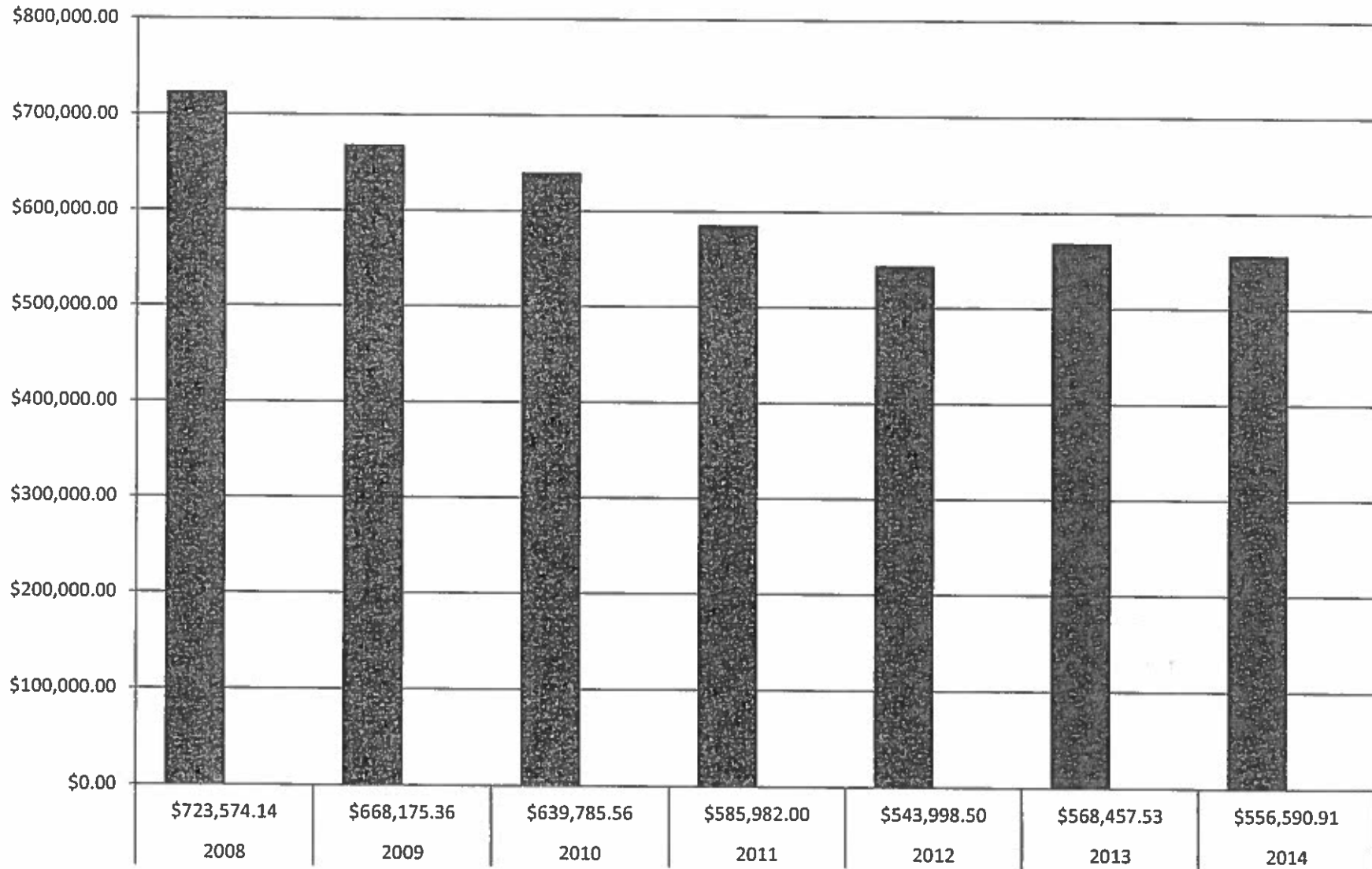


COMPETITIVE GRANT 2008-2014
